RE: 2023 Annual Report of the Louisiana Public Defender Board

Speaker DeVillier, President Henry, members of the Louisiana legislature:

In 2023, the Louisiana Public Defender System represented over 145,000 people statewide through the efforts of over 850 public defenders and over 400 support staff without any waitlists in either capital or noncapital cases.

I am very proud to report that at the end of CY23 there are no more districts in "Restriction of Services" ("ROS"). ROS was a terrible and misguided policy first implemented in the Louisiana public defender system in 2015 in response to looming budget cuts. At one time 15 public defender offices notified local and state leaders of their inability to perform their important duties and would restrict services. That is something we are not going to do.

We are examining our protocols so that we can update them to ensure that we never go back to ROS anywhere at any time. In the face of a challenging budgetary climate, first we must correct inefficiencies that we find and second operate and administer the system as effectively and as prudently as possible as we work toward a new funding source that is sufficient, reliable, and renewable. I am also happy to report that we have purchased twelve public defender offices in eleven districts with money appropriated to us by the legislature for that purpose. The main inspiration for the building fund was Hurricane Laura's destruction of the Calcasieu Parish Public Defender Office. In 2023, we finally completed the purchase of a public defender building in Calcasieu Parish. Thank you.

Reforms are needed. We need a criminal justice system we can pay for and a reliable, renewable, sufficient funding source independent of the state general fund with which to pay for it.

Thank you, again, for your leadership. I look forward to working with each of you and your colleagues toward our common goal of a criminal justice system that can operate properly for the benefit of all of Louisiana including the indigent people accused of crimes.

LPDB CY 2023 RECOMMENDATIONS FOR NEEDED CHANGES IN THE LAW

- 1) Creation of a stable, reliable, sufficient funding source for public defense
 - a. Provide a stable, reliable, sufficient funding source for public defense, including resources to conduct investigative work, utilize experts, and seek appellate review. This would improve services provided to individuals charged with crimes or delinquent offenses and potentially decrease the likelihood of an innocent person being convicted of a crime.
 - b. Provide increased funding for indigent parent representation. Increased investment in parent representation will allow the State to access partial matching funds from Title IV-E, which now allows states to include parent and child representation in its funding claim.
- 2) Focus on non-carceral, rehabilitative interventions

We urge the legislature to review all laws that affect the criminal justice system with an eye toward de-emphasizing incarceration as a first, or only, option. Rather, we urge an emphasis on amending La.C.Cr.Pro. Articles 902 and 903 to provide tools and services that make Louisiana safer by reducing crime, improving lives, and creating productive citizens. These positive outcomes can come from a criminal justice system that focuses on exploring the roots of behaviors known to drive recidivism such as: undiagnosed/untreated mental health issues; untreated drug addiction, and; lack of education/job skills.

Louisiana cannot incarcerate itself out of these problems. Further, focusing on incarceration alone subjects the State of Louisiana to increased costs. For example, when a person has untreated or undiagnosed schizophrenia or PTSD from military service and commits an offense, he should be treated appropriately for these conditions. Prisons, which are ill-equipped to deal with this type of issue should not be a substitute for necessary mental health treatment. The same is true for people addicted to opioids or other substances. Prison does not provide the appropriate resources to fix the underlying problem. This in turn, increases the likelihood that the individual will engage in future illegal activity which contributes to the rate of recidivism. This suggests that the criminal justice system is not working for many of the offenders who enter the system. Our failure to address the underlying causes of incarceration results not only in economic costs but also negatively impacts the incarcerated individual's family, friends, and community. Together, we can address these drivers of recidivism and reduce the exorbitant costs of incarceration while building individuals into productive, well-adjusted citizens. This is perhaps the greatest opportunity for societal improvement and savings of public dollars in all of Louisiana.

Such a major improvement cannot be accomplished at the margins. We must reimagine the operation of the criminal justice system and re-prioritize the allocation of resources - away from retributive interventions such as jails and prisons and towards rehabilitative interventions. We believe that this initiative will positively impact all corners of the criminal justice system, from defenders to judges, prosecutors, prison officials, probation officers, and the Louisiana citizenry at large.

LPDB CY 2023 RECOMMENDATIONS FOR NEEDED CHANGES IN THE LAW

- 3) Preserve state resources by eliminating the death penalty as a sentencing option in current and future cases and provide for resentencing of inmates currently under a sentence of death to a life sentence. Cases with a possible death verdict are extraordinarily expensive to prosecute, defend, and if a sentence of death is imposed, expensive to hold the person in prison.
- 4) Amend 15:529.1(c) to provide for a shortened cleansing time for prior convictions to be used to enhance sentences.
- 5) Eliminate life without parole sentences for offenses committed prior to the offender turning 18 years old.
- 6) Reduce the maximum length of a custodial disposition for non-violent offenses in juvenile delinquency cases.
- 7) Develop common sense rules aimed at removing low-risk youth from incarceral settings, to reduce incarcerated youth populations, reducing harm to youth, their families, and communities, and focusing limited state and local resources on the youth with the highest needs.
- 8) Reform Ch. C. art. 1015(5)(b) to clarify that an indigent parent shall not be subject to termination of parental rights based on failure to pay fees associated with Art. 685.
- 9) Amend 39:100.210(C)(2)(c) to provide that any funds distributed to the Louisiana Public Defender Board through the vape tax be used to cover salary and benefits for district personnel.



Rémy Voisin Starns (pronunciation of name is: **ray**'·me) is the State Public Defender. As the State Public Defender, Mr. Starns oversees the entire 64-parish public defense system in Louisiana which represents almost 88% of all persons accused of crimes statewide.

Prior to his appointment as State Public Defender, Mr. Starns was an assistant district attorney in Avoyelles Parish and practiced civil and criminal law in a wide range of matters in both state and federal court.

Mr. Starns graduated from LSU in 1993 with a Bachelor of Arts in political science with minors in Latin and Classical Civilization and lettered on the football team. Mr. Starns holds law degrees from Loyola University New Orleans School of Law and Tulane Law School.

LOUISIANA PUBLIC DEFENDER BOARD CONTRACT PROGRAMS (CY23)

Public Defenders represent more than 142,000 people annually throughout the 42 districts and 64 parishes of Louisiana. The Louisiana Public Defender Board has a legislative mandate to provide representation, but it does not have the authority to provide direct client representation or hire public defender staff. The Board has contracted with eight private law firms, as permitted by La. R.S. 15:147 (C)(1), to represent indigent people in delinquency, capital, and appellate cases. In addition, the Board is required by La. R.S. 15:169 and 15:178 to appoint counsel for appellate and post-conviction cases in which a death sentence has been imposed at the trial level.

The LPDB's contracts with each program office contain provisions for monthly reporting to the LPDB and audits by the Legislative Auditor. They also provide for compliance with performance standards enforceable by the Board, and for termination of the contracts for failure to meet Board requirements. These requirements include adhering to the ethical rules of the Louisiana Supreme Court, violations of which may result in termination of the contracts.

The programs are as follows:

BATON ROUGE CAPITAL CONFLICT OFFICE (BRCCO)

Kyla Blanchard-Romanach is the director of BRCCO. BRCCO employs the team approach to capital defense as required by the Capital Guidelines. The office includes a staff of attorneys, mitigation specialists, and investigators, thereby promoting cost-efficiency. The office is currently handling cases throughout the state in an effort to ensure that all defendants facing the death penalty are represented by certified counsel. As of December 1, 2023, BRCCO merged into the 19th PDO creating capital capacity in that district office.

CAPITAL APPEALS PROJECT (CAP)

Cecelia Kappel is the director of the Capital Appeals Project, which handles all capital appeals for indigents who have been sentenced to death. CAP work has focused on capital appeals but has branched out to include nearly every aspect of a capital case, juvenile cases, and assistance to public defenders. CAP staff includes attorneys, mitigation specialists, and investigators, as CAP provides capital trial consultation support, representation at the trial court level for the motion for new trial proceedings in death cases, as well as pre-indictment representation in new death penalty cases. The office is located in New Orleans. CAP also handles post-conviction cases wherein CPCPL is ineligible due to conflicts. CAP acts as resource counsel to public defenders across the state.

CAP has been tasked by the SPD to a pilot program that assists with supervisory writs to the public defenders of the Fourth and Fifth Circuits, starting in FY22. This project allows line defenders to aggressively engage in writ practice pre-trial and during the trial, by providing trained appellate attorneys to consult and draft writ applications and oppositions. The SPD is working toward statewide implementation of this program.

LOUISIANA PUBLIC DEFENDER BOARD CONTRACT PROGRAMS (CY23)

CAPITAL DEFENSE PROJECT OF SOUTHEAST LOUISIANA (CDPSELA or CDP)

CDP is set up for the primary purpose of providing capital case defense representation to those persons accused of offenses for which the State of Louisiana may seek the death penalty as punishment if the person is found guilty of having committed a capital offense. CDP is led by its director, Kerry Cuccia. Originally, the primary responsibility of CDP was to handle cases in which the Orleans Public Defender Office (OPD) was excluded because of conflicts; CDP was the first call provider for indigent defense in capital cases in Orleans Parish. However, CDP has also historically provided representation to indigent clients facing the death penalty throughout the state.

CAPITAL POST-CONVICTION PROJECT OF LOUISIANA ("CPCPL" DBA MWALIMU CENTER OF JUSTICE)

This organization handles capital post-conviction representation of indigent defendants whose cases have progressed through the trial and appellate levels. CPCPL staff attorneys have successfully represented several clients whose cases were overturned for such reasons as ineffective assistance of counsel at the guilt and/or penalty phase of trial, failure by prosecutors to disclose important evidence, newly discovered evidence of innocence and evidence adduced as a result of junk science. CPCPL also handles direct capital appeals when the Capital Appeals Project has a conflict of interest or there are co-defendants in a single case.

In 2020 Matilde Carbia took the helm at CPCPL. She and her staff work on as many cases as they can ethically handle at any particular time. The program also monitors cases in the pipeline in order to keep track of future needs.

LOUISIANA APPELLATE PROJECT (LAP)

Christopher Aberle is the director of the Louisiana Appellate Project. The LAP provides appellate representation for indigent defendants in all non-capital felony appeals arising from all of the districts. The LAP also represents youths in appeals of felony-grade delinquency adjudications. The Louisiana Public Defender Board has contracted with the LAP to provide these appellate services for the district offices.

LOUISIANA CAPITAL ASSISTANCE CENTER (LCAC)

Richard Bourke serves as director of LCAC and employs a staff of lawyers, mitigation specialists and investigators. Founded 30 years ago in its current form, this program provides leadership, mentoring, and guidance to the capital defense community. LCAC has influenced capital representation after the restoration of the death penalty in the South. Based on its reputation, LCAC attracts interns, law students, and lawyers from around the world to volunteer their services to LCAC and its clients.

LCAC provides direct services statewide, representing indigent capital defendants following arrest all the way through trial, as well as providing representation at motion for new trial and on direct appeal as needed. Pursuant to its contract, LCAC also serves as resource counsel to provisionally certified defense lawyers pursuant to Capital Defense Guideline 915(G)(2). This service is

essential to educating, mentoring, and overseeing the work of provisionally certified counsel to ensure the delivery of quality legal representation.

In addition to direct services, LCAC provides general support services to other organizations and often is able to ameliorate crises faced by counsel.

LOUISIANA CENTER FOR CHILDREN'S RIGHTS (LCCR)

LPDB contracts with The Louisiana Center for Children's Rights (LCCR) to handle *Miller v. Alabama* cases and *Montgomery v. Louisiana* cases and also juvenile delinquency cases in Orleans Parish.

INNOCENCE PROJECT NEW ORLEANS (IPNO)

The Louisiana Public Defender Board has a contract for partial funding of the Innocence Project New Orleans (IPNO) which, since its inception in 2001, has won the freedom or exoneration of 46 wrongfully convicted individuals who collectively spent more than 1,132 years in prison for crimes they did not commit. IPNO is one of the most successful innocence organizations in the country. IPNO also advocates for systemic changes to decrease the risk of wrongful convictions. The executive director of IPNO is Jee Park.

LOUISIANA WRIT SERVICE

The LPDB contracts with attorneys to take writs in the appropriate courts of Appeal and the Louisiana Supreme Court.

Budget

The appropriation for FY23 was \$48,135,927. Additionally, the State Public Defender Rémy Starns (SPD) secured the following grants during Calendar Year 2023:

- 1. Office of Justice Programs (OJP), U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) awarded LPDB a grant under the funding opportunity entitled Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. Enhancing Juvenile Indigent Defense, in the amount of \$445,248 over a four-year period. The grant period is from October 1, 2020, through September 30, 2023. This grant period was extended to December 31, 2023 to allow all the funds to be expended. For FY 24, we have budgeted \$75,822.37 for this program.
- 2. The Department of Children and Family Services contracts with LPDB to allow public defenders access to federal Title IV-E reimbursement for the claimable expenses for representing parents. This program started in 2020 following a change in the federal regulations governing Title IV-E claims that redefined "foster care expenses" to include representation for children and parents. We anticipate receiving approximately \$800,000 in federal funds in FY 24, which are used to support an appellate unit for CINC and TPR cases and multidisciplinary projects in the several districts.
- 3. The Louisiana Commission on Law Enforcement (LCLE) awarded LPDB a grant in the amount of \$74,999 for a financial auditor to review and assist districts in completing their monthly financial reports. The original grant period was from August 15, 2022, through June 30, 2023

To date, all grant activities including timely and accurate submission of monthly billing have been completed.

Our appropriated budget for FY 24 was \$51,463,845. The Joint Legislative Committee on the Budget gave LPDB approval to carryforward funds from FY 23 of \$305,913. Additionally, two BA-7s were approved totaling \$49,768. LPDB's current FY 24 existing operating budget is \$51,819,526.

The SPD submitted the FY 25 LPDB operating budget request to the State of Louisiana's Office of Planning and Budget on October 31, 2023. The budget request for the FY 25, which begins July 1, 2024, is \$62,020,505. Included in the request is an increase to the Louisiana Public Defender Fund of \$5M (million) (rounded) which includes a \$2.7M (rounded) increase to the District Assistance Fund. Also requested is a building fund appropriation in Aid to Local Governments – Demonstrated Need of \$2M.

<u>Compliance – Trial-Level</u>

Pursuant to La. R.S. 15:157, the Trial-Level Compliance Officer is responsible for coordinating oversight efforts of LPDB. Michael A. Mitchell continues to perform the duties of the Trial Level Compliance Officer for the Louisiana Public Defender Board.

In CY23, TLCO continues to monitor database compliance. The continuing goal is to obtain accurate figures on the numbers and types of cases handled in each district and assist District Chiefs in monitoring the frequency of visits with incarcerated clients. Additionally, LPDB staff, in partnering with District Chiefs and their staff, worked tirelessly to account for all cases within the database, whether active or closed. We continue to significantly improve data collection and accountability through a joint effort and cooperation. The database cleanup made it easier to identify and address compliance issues.

Staff use a variety of tools to monitor compliance in the field, including frequent visits to the district offices, database review, telephone, and zoom communication, and LPDB's Comprehensive Site Visit Protocol. These protocols include a combination of database and reporting review, court observation, file review, employee and stakeholder surveys, input, and interviews with the District Defender and district office staff.

Pursuant to La. R.S. 15:148(4) and Boards policy, TLCO reviewed, investigated, and responded to Client complaints received from Districts statewide.

Pursuant to La. R.S.15:147(B)(20) and Boards Policy, the SPD has contracted with University of Louisiana at Monroe (ULM) to create a program to continue the extensive training program, started by the TLCO and the now vacated position of Deputy SPD, Director of Training in CY21. ULM provided the delivery of experienced legal information dissemination by seasoned legal professionals in the form of frequent training sessions for District Line Defenders. ULM employed a cast of seasoned attorneys to lead these training sessions. Additionally, ULM has divided the state into seven (7) Regions and has elicited the assistance of seasoned attorneys from each region to assist the instructor in leading these sessions. These training courses may range from database training to Jury Selection.

ULM hosted approximately 35 Training Sessions in CY23. The following is a list of ULM Training Seminars for the CY23.

Training offered CLE Credit with 426 total in attendance.

As required by Act 237 of the 2022 Regular Legislative Session, LPDB is contracting with the University of Louisiana at Monroe (ULM) to conduct both in person and virtual training across the state. ULM has conducted the following trainings:

Thirty-nine of the forty-two districts in the State sent at least one defender to at least one training.

Information and Technology Management (ITM) Program Development and Resource Management (PDRM)

In Calendar Year 2023, between January 4th and February 1st, the SPD and ITM Division spearheaded the production and dissemination of the 700+ page LPDB Annual Report in collaboration with the entire LPDB staff as well as all 42 District PDOs. Each PDO produced three reports to LPDB staff providing a summary of each PDOs physical, fiscal, and human resources and procedures—all due to LPDB between January 10th and 15th so that the proofreading, layout and formatting, printing, binding and digital dissemination could be completed by the February 1st deadline set by statute. Also, the SPD staff produced a 48-page overview of LPDB divisional reports as well as numerous other statewide reports on client counts, cases and charges counts, fiscal activity, and decisions and actions of the Board. Despite the extremely tight deadline, the report has been considered by the Division of Administration (DoA) as the "Gold Standard of Annual Reports" among state agencies for several years running.

In the 2023 calendar year, under the direction of the State Public Defender, the ITM Officer Dr. Erik Stilling, and the ITM Division staff continued the development of several on-going projects and initiated several new projects, some of which are still under development.

Most notably, the ITM division completed the 18-month development and deployment of a new version of the highly customized defenderData Version 7.0 Case Management System and Financial Management System. This was done in large part through weekly focus groups with a highly skilled beta-test group comprised of PDO database experts who were instrumental in identifying bugs and suggesting improvements to existing features, as well as recommending entirely new features.

Also, in collaboration with Dr. Tiffany Simpson (the LPDB Legislative Liaison), several Program Office leaders and PDO Chiefs, the ITM staff developed a single-page data entry feature for Capital Program Office data collection and a detailed Capital Case Monthly Report per the direction of the Board.

As directed by the SPD, ITM staff continually monitored post-Pandemic losses of CUFs through comparative analyses with pre-Pandemic CY19 and CY21 data contrasted against LASC Annual Report data regarding charge filings for the past decade. The SPD also continually monitored district office finances through ITM monthly solvency analyses as well as various ad hoc analyses to resolve specific issues for the Board, for staff, and for individual district offices.

Dr. Stilling and Dr. Simpson collaborated with the SPD on an in-depth analysis of the most recent 1500+ capital cases in order to argue for SB107, a bill promoting the reduction of the number of aggravating factors that make a homicide eligible for the death penalty. The analysis considered those aggravators which actually resulted in a death penalty indictment as opposed to those aggravators which, while eligible for death, very rarely – if ever— resulted in a death penalty indictment. The bill was ultimately not enacted. However, the research was the impetus for a complete revision and redesign of the death penalty data collection software as mentioned above. The software design was completed by ITM staff and Dr. Simpson in December of 2023 and is slated for software development starting in March of 2024.

Dr. Stilling also worked closely with the State Public Defender, LPDB Legislative Liaison and Deputy-SPD for Juvenile Services on the Louisiana Violent Crime Task Force to identify trends in very violent juvenile offenses in Louisiana as compared to several comparable and neighboring states and the national average.

ITM worked closely with the State Public Defender, the Trial-level Compliance Officer and other LPDB executives, in the maintenance of a tracking system for O-level funding requests and disbursements. Additionally, ITM staff has helped implement the LPDB monthly newsletter under the direction of the State Public Defender and the Legislative Liaison officer.

In addition to these projects, ITM has a broad array of responsibilities falling under the headings of Information Management, as well as Technology Development, Deployment and Management, and Program Development and Resource Management. Per the requirements of the Public Defender Act, the SPD implemented online or automated technologies to assist district-level management with uniform reporting on financial, personnel compensation, harassment prevention training and incident reporting, and budget requests, as well as programs and technologies to promote state and local-level data-driven decision-making.

The SPD achieves all this by providing real-time feedback analytics on the attorneys' and district office's caseload, workload, case outcomes, and financial and personnel compensation data. Such analytics enhance decision-making for the district offices, the Board, and the SPD. This is all done completely online using a cloud-based system with continuously updated online security measures, housed in a secure location with bio-scan physical access procedures to protect the clients' information and the attorneys' work product. ITM also maintains the public-facing LPDB.LA.GOV website as well as two secure back-end websites which are used as support platforms for emergency preparedness and for annual report data collection, and for the real-time analytics feedback system called the Dashboard Reporting Center. This system provides instantaneous financial and case-related analyses for each district defender and for the SPD and his executive staff, and the Board. The ITM division also provides training for new District

Defenders in the use of these technologies and conducts periodic online and on-site training for district office staff and line attorneys, provides a helpdesk for telephone and email troubleshooting and training, and reviews database updates and improvements per users' suggestions.

Dr. Stilling is a founding member of the Indigent Defense Research Association (IDRA) and served as one of its founding board members until his term ended in November of 2023. He also serves at the national level as Technology and Data Analytics advisor to the NLADA-American Council of Chief Defenders, and to the National Association of Public Defenders.

<u>Juvenile</u>

The 2023 calendar year saw a significant reduction in the reported chaos at Office of Juvenile Justice facilities. While the years 2021 and 2022 had more than a dozen incidents of escapes or riots significant enough to generate media attention, there were no serious incidents of that nature in 2023. This does not mean that the Office of Juvenile Justice did not have problems. In September, Chief Judge Shelly Dick of the Middle District of Louisiana ruled that OJJ needed to move youth out of the controversial Bridge City Center for Youth – West Feliciana facility, on the grounds of the Louisiana State Penitentiary, which had opened in late 2022. While OJJ had intended to close the facility by the end of the year, Judge Dick ruled that the state needed to move the youth by mid-September. The youth were moved to a converted adult facility in Jackson Parish, contracted from the parish.

The facility in Jackson Parish also has issues and it is unclear whether youth are better off there. There are reports of youth being maced there, a breaking down of the sight and sound separation requirements between youth and adult inmates, and the report that the same facility has been illegally holding pre-adjudication youth despite not having proper licensing.

In good news, the dramatic increase in youth violent offending in 2020 – 2022 appears to have reversed. Violent crime generally appears to be returning to pre-pandemic levels, including for youth. Deputy Public Defender – Director of Juvenile Defender Services Richard M. Pittman has advocated since 2022 that the increase in violent offending and the chaos at OJJ both stem from the COVID-19 crisis. It is well-documented that societal disruptions such as school closures, isolation, and widespread early deaths led to a generalized mental health crisis that hit children particularly hard.

It hit youth in OJJ facilities even harder. The pandemic disrupted operations at facilities, canceled rehabilitative services and school in the facilities, disrupted pro-social activities including visits with family, and led to a staffing crisis that sapped OJJ's capacities to deal with the problems. Many youths in OJJ custody have been there for the entirety of the COVID-19 crisis. Most of the youth in OJJ facilities are there for low level or non-violent offenses, including some who are in custody for misdemeanors or FINS offenses.

The juvenile defense community faces many challenges as a result of the state of affairs in OJJ and in the world at large. While the spike in violent offending appears to be temporary and already

abating, the social and political landscape surrounding juvenile justice has changed dramatically. Many courts have become more reluctant to release youth from custody when given the opportunity, even in cases where youth adjudicated of non-violent offenses should enjoy a presumption of release. Some courts appear to believe the crisis at the office of juvenile justice and disruptions of rehabilitative services means that youth should be there longer. This has led to overcrowding at OJJ facilities, exacerbating the problems caused by staffing shortages. Most of the youth in OJJ facilities are there for low level or non-violent offenses, including some who are in custody for misdemeanors or FINS offenses. The Office of Juvenile Justice consistently reports that there are youth waiting in local detention centers because there is no placement available in an OJJ facility. This, in turn, exacerbates the problem of detention overcrowding and unavailability, which in turn leads to more transfers of eligible youth to adult criminal prosecution.

In addition to issues at court, the attitude of the legislature towards juvenile justice has shifted dramatically. Since 2021, the legislature has entertained (and sometimes passed) increasingly punitive bills related to juvenile justice. Some have become law, while others have been vetoed by the governor. Still others were stalled by the threat of a veto. With a change in administration in January 2024, the roadblocks in front of punitive legislation are cleared. The state will likely pass into law a broad range of rollbacks of juvenile justice reforms in 2024 and return juvenile justice to the more punitive days of prior decades. It will be more important than ever that skilled and dedicated professionals advocate for youth and ensure due process in courts.

This year, the legislature passed Act 445, which impacts juvenile practitioners and youth significantly, especially outside of metropolitan areas. Among other effects, Act 445 amends Ch. C. Art. 815 to allow nonmetropolitan jurisdictions to hold youth accused of delinquent acts for up to 48 hours in adult jails under the following circumstances:

- The youth is accused of a nonstatus offense, i.e. a charge that would be criminal if committed by an adult.
- A continued custody hearing is held within 48 hours.
- There is no acceptable alternative placement to the jail.
- A certification that the youth will have continuous visual supervision and sight and sound separation from adult inmates.

The Juvenile Division has several concerns. First, there is no lower limit on the age of a youth eligible to be placed in jail. The lower age limit for a delinquency case is 10 years old, so this provision allows children as young as 10 to be held in an adult jail for up to 48 hours.

Second, the requirements of "no acceptable alternative placement" and certification of conditions are easily manipulated and nearly impossible to account. The issue would appear to skirt appellate review as well, so long as the 48-hour rule is observed, making the rules effectively meaningless in a jurisdiction where the authorities were not inclined to follow them. It also disincentivizes jurisdictions from contracting with out-of-parish juvenile detention centers.

Third, the Juvenile Division already has accounts of jurisdictions simply disregarding the rule, apparently believing the law now allows unfettered incarceration of youth in jail.

Fourth, the use of the word "nonmetropolitan" in the article has no explicit definition. There are multiple ways to interpret the term. In order to comply with the federal Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act (JJDPA), the term would need to be more limited than the definition used in a different Title of the Code.¹

Act 445 also allows youth in nonmetropolitan areas to be held in jail for up to 48 hours if they are charged with transferable offenses.² The conditions of application are the same, except for potentially a different and more expansive definition of 'nonmetropolitan' applying.

The Juvenile Division is continuing to work with the Office of Juvenile Justice and other entities to improve representation of youth in custody and to seek solutions to the ongoing chaos and overcrowding. On July 27, 2023, the Juvenile Division hosted a 'Summit' between juvenile defenders and OJJ personnel at the Paul M. Hebert Law Center to discuss ways to better advocate for release of youth from custody, particularly when OJJ is itself supporting release. Deputy Secretary Otha "Curtis" Nelson, Jr. was highly supportive of the event and encouraged employee attorneys to attend and attended himself. The State Public Defender delivered opening remarks. The Summit was well-attended by both OJJ attorneys and juvenile defenders and received positive feedback. There were 48 attendees. The Juvenile Division considers the Summit a success. We are hoping this can be a regular event in the future.

In 2023, the Juvenile Division continued and expanded previously initiated projects, including the CINC Appellate Project and the Title IV-E Reimbursement Program.

The CINC Appellate Project went through the 2023 calendar year with continuity of operations. The project continues to contract with Douglas Lee Harville of Shreveport, Annette Roach of Lake Charles, and Jane Hogan of Hammond to provide consultation, appellate services, and writ drafting in CINC and Termination cases for the districts. Some of the most effective work the Project has done is through consultations with trial counsel. Often, trial counsel will consult with the attorneys of the Project, who will assist in developing arguments, preserving objections, and planning for a record with an eye towards appeal, only for the trial counsel to then achieve a good result that does not need to be brought to an appellate court. In 2023, the Project made 45 consultations, wrote 5 writs for defenders, and took appeals in 16 cases.

¹ Art. 301, in Title III reads, "As used in this Title, 'nonmetropolitan area" means a parish whose largest city has a population of fifty thousand or less and where the population f the entire parish is less than one hundred thousand." Art. 815 is not in Title III, so this definition does not explicitly apply. If this is ultimately the definition courts use, then the following parishes are metropolitan: Ascension, Bossier, Caddo, Calcasieu, East Baton Rouge, Jefferson, Lafayette, Livingston, Orleans, Ouachita, Rapides, St. Tammany, Tangipahoa, and Terrebonne. To comply with the JJDPA would add Acadia, Assumption, Cameron, De Soto, East Feliciana, Grant, Iberia, Lafourche, Morehouse, Plaquemines, Pointe Coupee, St. Bernard, St. Charles, St. Helena, St. James, St. John the Baptist, St. Martin, Union, Vermilion, West Baton Rouge, and West Feliciana to the list. If some of these parishes appear to be very rural and their inclusion nonsensical, it is because the JJDPA considers rural areas economically intertwined with a nearby city to be metropolitan. Contact the Juvenile Division for assistance in advocating for a limited definition.

² Because this is an amendment to Title III, the Title III definition of 'nonmetropolitan' explicitly applies. See above. This is a further argument in favor of a more limited definition of 'nonmetropolitan' for Art. 815, as the new rule described here would have no effect whatsoever if using the same definition.

The CINC Appellate Project is funded entirely with federal Title IV-E funds. The Title IV-E program reimburses states for the costs of "foster care services". A change in the Title IV-E guidelines several years ago recharacterized representation for children and parents in CINC and TPR cases as a foster care service, allowing states to begin claiming those expenses as part of its Title IV-E claim. Making these claims requires the agreement and cooperation of the state child welfare agency, an obstacle many states cannot overcome. In Louisiana, state DCFS, LPDB, and the child representation agencies have positive working relationships at the policy level that allows us to maximize our claims.

LPDB began making Title IV-E claims in 2020, and the number of claims has grown considerably in that time. The documentation required by the federal government is considerable and was not satisfied by the financial and compensation reports generated by districts prior to 2021. Instead, the federal government has required more substantial documentation of expenses and information on cases that was not previously collected. Since 2020, the staff has worked with districts to incrementally automate parts of the Title IV-E claiming process to reduce the burden on districts and on staff. This was accomplished in 2022 by making changes to how CINC cases are reported in the database, to add signifiers for "In Home" and "Out of Home" cases, to allow us accurate automatic case counts of foster care cases and non-foster care cases. This change continued in 2023 and continues to work well as a substantial improvement over reporting by hand.

In 2023, the Board approved reserving \$1.25 million in state DAF funds to partially reimburse districts for documented spending on parent representation. This amount represents 50% of the estimated spending on parent representation in the state, and districts are reimbursed \$0.50 for every dollar of documented expenditures. The reimbursement program incentivizes PDOs to document and report CINC expenditures to LPDB. It began in July 2022. Over the first six months of FY24 the districts have documented roughly \$1.4M in expenditures and have received about \$700,000 in reimbursements from LPDB.

In previous years, the staff also worked with districts to expand the ways that districts can document expenditures. For attorneys who had mixed caseloads that included CINC/TPR cases, the federal government did not allow our normal methods of assigning weights to case types for purposes of assigning a portion of the attorney's compensation to parent representation. We have developed new methods of separately documenting parent representation spending that calls for timekeeping or encouraging separate contracts. Various districts are taking advantage of each option. This has allowed LPDB to expand its Title IV-E claim. In the first claim LPDB submitted, for the October – December 2019 quarter, the agency claimed \$79,396.51 in Title IV-E claims. Three years later, for the July – September 2023 time period (the last completed claim as of the time of writing), LPDB claimed \$211,894.24 from the Title IV-E Reimbursement Program.

Title IV-E funds are also used to fund projects in specific districts. Some of the Title IV-E funds have been distributed to some districts to fund pilot projects in multidisciplinary parent representation. Projects are currently funded in the 1st,4th, 9th, 21st, 22nd, 23rd, 30th/36th, and 29th/40th districts. These districts have hired or will hire either a social worker or parent partners to assist in Child In Need of Care cases. In addition, some of these funds are being used to partially support

a similar project in the 41st district which was previously supported by a private foundation grant which has expired.

DPD-JS Pittman and JJCO Simpson have participated in a number of juvenile justice and child welfare stakeholder groups during the year including the Pelican Center Training & Education Committee, the Children Justice Act Task Force, the CARE Advisory Committee for the Court Improvement Project, the Children's Code Committee of the Louisiana Law Institute, the Pelican Center Task Force, the Human Trafficking Prevention Commission, the Juvenile Justice Reform Act Implementation Commission, the Task Force on Juvenile Justice Facility Standards, the Juvenile Detention Alternative Initiative. These organizations have produced a variety of outputs that have benefited defenders, children, and parents, including access to training, and bills passed by the legislature and signed into law.

In addition to these state-level stakeholder organizations, Mr. Pittman and Dr. Simpson have been involved in the leadership of national organizations. Mr. Pittman serves on the Advisory Committee of the Gault Center South. He also sits on the Steering Committee of the American Bar Association's National Parent Representation Project.

The Juvenile Division held its annual training in person in 2023. The Delinquency Training was held in Baton Rouge on October 27. It included sessions on Hearsay & Objections, Children in Adult Jail, Legal Research Tools, Collaborative Practice Between Trial Counsel and Writ Counsel, and Ethics of Writ Practice. The Juvenile Division presented some sessions, and were joined by Prof. Jack Harrison, Prof. Hector Linares, Prof. Aimee Pittman, Prof. Melissa Strickland, and Mark Plaisance. There were 44 attendees.

The Parent Representation Training was held in Lafayette February 23, and was called the CINC Boot Camp in conjunction with the ULM Training Academy. It included sessions on procedure, Making The Record, and Incorporating Social Work. There were 8 attendees at the Lafayette session.

<u>Training</u>

During calendar year 2023, the Training Division did not have a Director of Training and so was limited on conducting trainings for public defenders. Nevertheless, the staff conducted 3 trainings, 2 in person and 1 hybrid zoom and in-person. A total of 106 public defenders attended the 4 training sessions.

The largest in-person trainings were the Juvenile Defender / OJJ "Summit" in July of 2023 and Juvenile Defender Training held in October 2023. A total of 92 defenders attended the two events. The Juvenile Division presented the following:

<u>Capital</u>

Michael A. Mitchell, Trial Level Compliance Officer, oversees the capital program governed by the LPDB for CY23. LPDB administers the Capital Expert Witness Fund. The process for accessing funding from LPDB involves the completion and submission of an Expert Witness Funding Application to the LPDB. Rémy Voisin Starns, State Public Defender, convenes a weekly meeting with the Trial Level Compliance Officer, a member of the Capital and Compliance Division support staff, and the Attorney or Program Director who is requesting funding approval to be determined based on needs and availability. Each meeting included either in-person or phone conferences with the program offices to discuss the funding requests.

There are currently 23 open, indicted, indigent capital cases being handled by Capital Programs and there is no wait list.

Building Fund

During the 2023 Regular Legislative Session, the Legislature appropriated \$1,300,000 for the purchase and renovation of public defender's offices. These dollars were used to purchase office buildings in the 14th (Calcasieu Parish) 35th (Grant Parish) Judicial District Public Defender's Offices. Additionally, the 32nd (Terrebonne Parish), who completed the purchase of their building in 2021 using their fund balance, was reimbursed for the money spent on the purchase of their building. Several years in the making, legislative appropriations provided to the 14th resulted in the office securing permanent Public Defender office space. In 2020, Hurricane Laura destroyed the district's office space.

Newsletter

In 2023, the SPD continued distribution of LPDB's monthly newsletter, *The Louisiana Defender...the Defense Never Rests*. The newsletter was distributed to more than one thousand people by email. It highlights public defender successes, imparts information on training, compliance, legal issues, and general topics of importance to public defenders. The entire newsletter is compiled by the SPD's staff under the direction of JJCO Simpson who serves as Executive Editor.

Vape Tax

The Louisiana Legislature has passed legislation establishing a fund that has the potential to bring \$1.8 million to support salaries and benefits for public defenders. Act 414, which originated as HB635, creates the Department of Wildlife and Fisheries, Office of State Fire Marshall, and the Louisiana Public Defender Board Compensation Fund. The fund is monetized by an increase on the tax on vapor and electronic cigarette products.





NOTE: The individual District Estimated CY23 Fund Balance Depletion is estimated by subtracting district expenditures from combined State, Local, CUFs and Other funds. Note also that the large \$2.4M depletion in District 14 is an artifact of using fund balance monies from the prior year to help purchase the \$3.8M office building in Lake Charles. Further note that "Total State Funds" include a special State appropriation of \$900,000 to District 14 for the building purchase. There was another \$600,000 grant from the local government in Calcasieu for the building purchase which is reported under "Total Local Funds." Further special State appropriations of \$280,000 to District 32 and \$120,000 to District 35 for building purchases are included under "Total State Funds." 









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












DISTRICT REPORTS DATA COLLECTION METHODOLOGY (CY23)

This methodology discussion covers the techniques employed to help the district offices produce their annual reports. These district reports are required per R.S.15:174, which provides that each district defender is required to submit to LPDB a detailed annual report on the prior year's "workload, resources, employees, and expenditures for each district or service region." The following 42 individual district reports cover each individual Judicial District Public Defenders' Office (PDOs) regarding several factors: basic office information, district structures, caseload information, and budget information. This information is reported to LPDB by the District Defenders to the best of their knowledge and belief at the time of the submission.

Preceding each district's report is an executive summary produced by LPDB staff using the selfreported information from each district as well as LPDB analytics, including: information regarding the percentages of cases handled by the nature of the cases (Offenses Against Persons, Drug Possession, Drug Distribution, etc.); total numbers of Felonies, Misdemeanors, Delinquencies and Child in Need of Care cases; Conviction and User's Fees (CUFs), State Funding, Local Funding, and Other Funding (federal, corporate or philanthropic funds) over the past six years; criminal and traffic ticket filing information from the Louisiana Supreme Court Annual Reports since 2014 (CY23 data is unavailable until Spring of 2024). These district report executive summaries are analytics based on each district's self-reported information on their caseload and fiscal activity and can vary in part due to their differing local procedures and environments.

Following the executive summary is the first section of each district report. This is a narrative produced by district offices which lists: basic contact information, including emergency contact information; listing of local government cash and in-kind support; descriptions of the structure of the local office and the local criminal justice system, including key figures in the local system; the staffing information and supervisory structure of the district public defenders' office; contact information for the assistant public defenders (provided only in the hardcopy and digital versions for protection of privacy); and an inventory of the office's present technology, hardware and software. (It should be noted that district staffing information in the narratives represents a "snapshot" of the staff collected near year's end, typically in November or December, and is subject to change at any time due to staffing changes.) With the exception of the district's population statistics, these data are self-reported by the districts through the web-based annual survey questionnaire distributed to each District Defender near year's end. Population data is captured using the U.S. Census Bureau estimates.

The second section reports caseloads for each district, aggregating new and pending cases (from prior years) and outcomes of charges disposed in CY23. These data are also self-reported by the district offices, gathered through each district's data entry in the case management system. The data are collected throughout the year by each attorney or the attorney's designee through data entry to the LPDB online database. In 2011, the LPDB purchased a new case management system for the districts and deployed it in June 2011. Data from an earlier database preceding June 2011

(as far back as 2007) was converted and migrated into the new database from the old database also in June of 2011. Data are reported on new cases received in the year of report, cases from prior years which were closed that year, cases from prior years which were still active that year, and the total of new and pending cases for the year of the report. Some cases listed as pending have been open for several years yet have been periodically reviewed by the districts to ensure these are truly still open cases, noting that complex cases such as juvenile, felony, capital and life without parole (LWOP) cases may indeed remain active even after several years or may have been declared dormant for some time (thus not counted in workloads or caseloads) but had been re-opened during the year of the report (e.g., fugitive cases re-opened months or even years later when the client is found).

It is important to note that the database periodically, automatically changes the status from any of the several active statuses to "Auto-dormant" for every case which has sat idly untouched in the database for excessive periods of time in order to discount cases which are accidently left UNCLOSED. Cases which are in fugitive or other inactive statuses or in auto-dormant status, or which have not been reviewed periodically and confirmed as active cases are EXCLUDED from the case counts that support caseload analyses. Further, cases untouched for excessive periods of time are set to a status of "Auto-Closed" signifying that the case is not to be counted as part of a workload or caseload, but have not been officially disposed by the Court or DA and yet are unlikely to be re-opened at a later date—although it IS possible to do so. These measures help ensure the accuracy of case counts and guard against overcounting.

Additionally, data are reported in this annual report regarding the disposition of charges in a manageable number of very broad categories for presentation purposes, with labels such as "Guilty as Charged," "Dismissed" and "Plea to Lesser Charge," for example, each of which include numerous nuanced outcomes similar and relevant to these broad labels. Nonetheless, the disposition data reported give a useful graphic impression of the outcomes of cases and charges. Given the February 1, 2024 deadline for submission of this Calendar Year 2023 annual report, a small number of case closings and pending cases may not be completely up to date. This is particularly true for cases handled very near the end of the calendar year, as the time-lag between case activity at year's end and case data entry may preclude some small amount of activity from being entered in time for this report.

The District CY23 Financial Summary Tables, the third and final section of the districts' reports, address revenues and expenditures by individual line item in a very granular fashion. All information contained in this section of the districts' reports was compiled automatically through the Financial Management System (FMS) component of the LPDB database. This was done through the online FMS report query using data from each district's monthly financial reports for the year of the annual report. These data were submitted online to the Louisiana Public Defender Board by the individual Public Defender Offices monthly and reviewed by LPDB's staff monthly. All monthly reports since August 2012 have been reported online, and all prior hard-copy

monthly reports from 2008 through 2012 were converted to digital data and migrated into the database.

"Revenues" include the statutorily mandated Conviction and Users' Fees (CUFs), as well as several other statutorily mandated fees, and "Other" funding sources such as federal, private, or corporate grants, or donations, and in a very few districts, local special or general appropriations from local governments, and in District 19, a modest tax from car rentals. These are reported in this third and final section and show the actual amounts of state funding received in the calendar year regardless of which fiscal year the funds were appropriated. To report the amount of fiscal-year state funds actually received by a district on a calendar year basis, the state revenue portion of the financial summaries were computed by adding all the District Assistance Funds, along with all other emergency or supplemental state funds disbursed to the district office between January 1st and December 31st of 2023 (i.e., the second half of FY23, January to June, and the first half of FY24, July to December).


While the data reported herein are believed and known to be accurate at the time of this writing, should the need for any corrections become evident in the future, changes will be made in the database and will be reflected in future reports.

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




Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar 2023, the primary charge in 6.68% (883) of the 13,223 cases handled by the 1st Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 56.9% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.


TRAFFIC FILINGS CY14-CY22 (Source: La. Supreme Court Annual Report -- 2023 LASC Data Not yet available)



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 1st Judicial District increased slightly from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUF collections, filing rates are expected to be slightly lower than the previous year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 1st Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$3,349,019 in total revenues. Only 29% of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the 45% received during 2019. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. During 2023, revenues collected from CUFs increased by \$90,000, however during that same time period, the office lost \$85,000 in funding from the city/parish government.

The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar 2023, the primary charge in 17.31% (259) of the 1,498 cases handled by the 2nd Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 47.9% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug and 40.4% were charged with a Schedule I drug. Schedule I drugs include heroin and hallucinogens like LSD and ecstasy. Marijuana is also a Schedule I drug, but for the purposes of this analysis have been separated into a separate category. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.




According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 2nd Judicial District decreased by 23% from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUF collections, filing rates are expected to be similar to those of the previous year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 2nd Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$604,218 in total revenues. Forty-one percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to 81% during 2019. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. During 2023, revenues collected from CUFs were collected at a rate similar to the previous year. The district office did not receive funding from any city or parish government within the tri-parish district.




Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar 2023, the primary charge in less than 5% (191) of the 3,881 cases handled by the 3rd Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 44.7% were charged with Marijuana Possession. An additional 36.6% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II Drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.






According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 3rd Judicial District increased by 21% from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to have increased from the previous year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 3rd Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$556,311 in total revenues. Ninety-three percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. During 2023, revenues collected from CUFs increased by 14%. In CY21, the state provided \$395,000 to the district for the purchase of a Public Defender Office building. This funding was appropriated by the Legislature in Act 45 of the 2020 Second Extraordinary Legislative Session. The loss of this one-time money accounts for the decrease in state funding from 2021 to 2022. The office did not receive any funding from city/parish government.




TRAFFIC FILINGS CY14-CY22 (Source: La. Supreme Court Annual Report -- 2023 LASC Data Not yet available)




Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar 2023, the primary charge in 13.03% (221) of the 1,701 cases handled by the 5th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 76% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II Drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.






According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 5th Judicial District increased by nearly 15% from the previous year. Filings remain 38% lower than 2019 filing levels. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to be higher than the previous year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 5th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$613,125 in total revenues. Forty-eight percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), exceeding the state average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. During 2023, revenues collected from CUFs increased by \$70,000, while state funding decreased by \$57,000. In CY21, the state provided \$165,000 to the district for the purchase of a Public Defender Office building. This funding was appropriated by the Legislature in Act 45 of the 2020 Second Extraordinary Legislative Session. The loss of this one-time money accounts for the decrease in state funding from CY21 to CY22. The office did not receive any funding from city/parish government.


TRAFFIC FILINGS CY14-CY22 (Source: La. Supreme Court Annual Report -- 2023 LASC Data Not yet available)


Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar 2023, the primary charge in 16.89% (456) of the 2,700 cases handled by the 7th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 59.2% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.






Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar 2023, the primary charge in 8.84% (75) of the 845 cases handled by the 8th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 55.4% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug while 36.2% were charged with a Possession of a Schedule I Drug. Schedule I drugs include heroin and hallucinogens like LSD and ecstasy. Marijuana is also a Schedule I drug, but for the purposes of this analysis have been separated into a separate category. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 8th Judicial District decreased by 8% from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 8th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$395,884 in total revenues. The office is reliant on state supplemental assistance as only 25% of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. During 2022, revenues collected from CUFs increased by \$16,000. The office did not receive any funding from the city/parish government.


Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar 2023, the primary charge in 6.77% (106) of the 1,566 cases handled by the 10th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 53.2% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II Drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 10th Judicial District decreased by 18% from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to be higher than the previous year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 10th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$575,360 in total revenues. Forty percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. During 2023, revenues collected from CUFs increased by \$35,000, while state funding increased by \$50,000. The office did not receive any funding from the city/parish government.




Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar 2023, the primary charge in 6.93% (119) of the 1,710 cases handled by the 11th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 71% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.


TRAFFIC FILINGS CY14-CY22 (Source: La. Supreme Court Annual Report -- 2023 LASC Data Not yet available)



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 11th Judicial District increased by 30% from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to be similar to rates from the previous year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 11th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$444,370 in total revenues. The office is reliant on state supplemental assistance as only 18% of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. The office did not receive any funding from the city/parish government.




Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar 2023, the primary charge in 11.40% (223) of the 1,954 cases handled by the 13th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 63.2% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.





The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.





According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 13th Judicial District increased by 56%. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to have increased for a fifth consecutive year.

During Calendar Year 2023, the 14th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$4,342,405 in total revenues. Only 29% of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), however this number is misleading as the district received in total \$1.5 million from state and local sources to complete the purchase of a public defender's office in the parish. The 14th Judicial District Public Defender's Office had been without a dedicated office since the devastation of Hurricane Laura in 2020.


health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar 2023, the primary charge in 9.87% (1,783) of the 18,066 cases handled by the 15th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 43.6% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 15th Judicial District increased by 5%. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUF collections, filing rates are expected to be similar to those from the previous year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 15th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$4,963,285 in total revenues. Thirty-seven percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. The office did not receive funding from the city/parish government.


health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar 2023, the primary charge in 13.13% (666) of the 5,073 cases handled by the 17th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 53.3% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.





During Calendar Year 2023, the 17th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$1,296,762 in total revenues, an increase of \$300,000 from the previous year. Thirty-one percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), which is fairly consistent with the statewide average. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. The district office experienced increases in both CUF collections and state funding, but did not receive funding from the city/parish government.




out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar 2023, the primary charge in 9.34% (186) of the 1,992 cases handled by the 18th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 58.9% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.


TRAFFIC FILINGS CY14-CY22 (Source: La. Supreme Court Annual Report -- 2023 LASC Data Not yet available)




According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 18th Judicial District decreased 17% from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to be similar to the previous year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 18th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$1,059,771 in total revenues. Sixty-five percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. In CY21, the state provided \$250,000 to the district for the purchase of a Public Defender Office building. This funding was appropriated by the Legislature in Act 45 of the 2020 Second Extraordinary Legislative Session. The loss of this one-time money accounts for the decrease in CY22 state funding. The office did not receive any funding from city/parish government.


TRAFFIC FILINGS CY14-CY22 (Source: La. Supreme Court Annual Report -- 2023 LASC Data Not yet available)



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 19th Judicial District increased by 8% from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to be similar to the previous year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 19th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$5,366,489 in total revenues. Only 24% of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. The district has faced declines in CUF revenues since the floods and civil unrest of 2016. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. The office received \$1,175,048 in funding from the city/parish government.







The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 20th Judicial District increased 17% from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to be similar to the previous year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 20th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$486,933 in total revenues. Forty percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. In CY21, the state provided \$145,000 to the district for the purchase of a Public Defender Office building. This funding was appropriated by the Legislature in Act 45 of the 2020 Second Extraordinary Legislative Session. The loss of this one-time money accounts for the decrease in state funding from CY21 to CY22. The office received \$45,000 in funding from the city/parish government.







Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar 2023, the primary charge in 12.22% (1,694) of the 13,860 cases handled by the 21st Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 59.7% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.




According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 21st Judicial District decreased slightly from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to have increased during the calendar year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 21st Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$4,218,660 in total revenues, an increase of nearly \$800,000 from the previous year. Forty-two percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. During 2023, revenues collected from CUFs increased by more than \$400,000, while state funding increased by nearly \$350,000. The office did not receive funding from the city/parish government.


Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar 2023, the primary charge in 12.89% (1,008) of the 7,157 cases handled by the 23rd Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 48.1% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.




According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 23rd Judicial District decreased for the sixth consecutive year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing may have increased in 2023.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 23rd Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$1,637,872 in total revenues. Forty-four percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. During 2023, revenues collected from CUFs increased by \$103,000, the office also received more than \$240,000 in additional state funds. The office did not receive funding from the city/parish government.


health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar Year 2023, the primary charge in 11.17% (2,499) of the 22,374 cases handled by the 24th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 40.3% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 24th Judicial District increased by nearly 10% from the previous year. While traffic filings increased during 2022, overall the number of filings has been reduced by 46% since 2018. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 24th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$4,322,805 in total revenues. Forty-seven percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. During 2023, revenues collected from CUFs increased by \$143,546, the office also received nearly \$412,000 in additional state funding. The office did not receive funding from the city/parish government.


TRAFFIC FILINGS CY14-CY22 (Source: La. Supreme Court Annual Report -- 2023 LASC Data Not yet available)

According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 26th Judicial District increased by 13%. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to be similar to the previous year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 26th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$2,364,732 in total revenues. Thirty-three percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), which is similar to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. During 2023, revenues collected from CUFs were almost equal to the previous year's collections. The office did not receive funding from the city/parish government.




out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar Year 2023, the primary charge in 3.76% (233) of the 6,193 cases handled by the 27th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 53.2% were charged with Possession of a Schedule I drug. Schedule I drugs include hallucinogens like LSD or ecstasy, heroin, and marijuana. However, for the purposes of this analysis, marijuana has been placed in its own category.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. 
TRAFFIC FILINGS CY14-CY22 (Source: La. Supreme Court Annual Report -- 2023 LASC Data Not yet available)




Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. During Calendar Year 2023, the primary charge in 7.19% (41) of the 565 cases handled by the 28th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 86.2% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.








Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar Year 2023, the primary charge in 11.59% (229) of the 1,973 cases handled by the 29th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 35% were charged with Marijuana Possession.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.


TRAFFIC FILINGS CY14-CY22 (Source: La. Supreme Court Annual Report -- 2023 LASC Data Not yet available)



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 29th Judicial District decreased by 6% from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to be higher than the previous year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 29th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$1,345,785 in total revenues. Sixty-one percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. The office did not receive funding from the city/parish government.




Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar Year 2023, the primary charge in 9.50% (225) of the 2,364 cases handled by the 31st Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 52.6% were charged with Possession of a Schedule I Drug. Schedule I drugs include heroin, hallucinogens like LSD or ecstasy and marijuana. However, for the purposes of this analysis, marijuana has been placed in its own category.





The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.





According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 31st Judicial District increased slightly. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to have increased from the previous year.

Of these cases, 43.8% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 32nd Judicial District increased by 11% from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to have increased.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 32nd Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$1,759,826 in total revenues. Thirty-six percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the 67% received during 2017. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. During 2023, revenues collected from CUFs increased by nearly \$150,000. State funding also increased by \$448,155, which includes \$280,000 in building funds. The office did not receive any funding from city/parish government.




Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar Year 2023, the primary charge in 15.10% (137) of the 904 cases handled by the 33rd Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 73.5% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar Year 2023, the primary charge in 8.98% (165) of the 1,841 cases handled by the 34th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 41.2% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.





The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 34th Judicial District decreased slightly from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to be similar to the previous year.

The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar Year 2023, the primary charge in 30.67% (327) of the 1,065 cases handled by the 35th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 73.4% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 35th Judicial District increased by 60% from the previous year. 2022 marked the first year since CY16 that saw an increase in traffic filings. Supreme Court filing data from 2023 is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUF collections, filing rates are expected to be similar to the previous year's rates.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 35th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$577,261 in total revenues. Only 24% of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. CUF collections have remained relatively stable over the last five years. State funding increased by \$191,513 which includes \$120,000 in building funds. The office did not receive funding from the city/parish government.




TRAFFIC FILINGS CY14-CY22 (Source: La. Supreme Court Annual Report -- 2023 LASC Data Not yet available)

Forty-eight percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. In CY21, the state provided \$148,000 to the district for the purchase of a Public Defender Office building. This funding was appropriated by the Legislature in Act 45 of the 2020 Second Extraordinary Legislative Session. The loss of this one-time money accounts for the decrease in state funding from 2021 to 2022. The office did not receive any funding from city/parish government.


Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar Year 2023, the primary charge in 31.84% (194) of the 486 cases handled by the 37th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 67.8% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 37th Judicial District decreased by 45% from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to be similar to the previous year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 37th Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$302,084 in total revenues. The office is reliant on state supplemental assistance as only 10% of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. The office did not receive funding from the city/parish government.




significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar Year 2023, the primary charge in 9.93% (290) of the 2,925 cases handled by the 40th Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 45.3% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.







TRAFFIC FILINGS CY14-CY22 (Source: La. Supreme Court Annual Report -- 2023 LASC Data Not yet available)




Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar Year 2023, the primary charge in just 1.63% (287) of the 17,618 cases handled by the 41st Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 73.6% were charged with Marijuana Possession.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.


TRAFFIC FILINGS CY14-CY22 (Source: La. Supreme Court Annual Report -- 2023 LASC Data Not yet available)



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, the number of traffic tickets filed in the 41st Judicial District decreased by 34% compared to the number filed the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to be similar to the previous year. (No data are available for 2019 when the City IT System was hacked.)



During Calendar Year 2023, the 41st Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$16,015,168 in total revenues. Only 9% of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. The City of New Orleans has made a significant investment in the Public Defender's Office, providing \$10,395,980 in revenues.

	Excessive workloads, depleted staff and attrition continue to be the biggest obstacles regarding our representation. There still remains a significant backlog of cases due in part to pandemic- related restrictions on trials, inmate transportation (or lack thereof) to court, and prosecutors' restrictive plea-negotiation policies. Additionally, the continued inequitable distribution of criminal legal system resources across the board almost ensures we are incapable of reaching or maintaining most professional legal standards. All of these significant challenges in Orleans Parish have a negative impact on recruitment and retention, and potentially harmful client relationships and service delivery.
Short Term Critical Issue Areas	Workloads for serious cases and overall office costs have drastically increased over the last couple of years. As violent crime in New Orleans peaked in 2022, the number of serious cases in Court also increased, particularly for Life Without Parole and virtual life cases. OPD represents more major felonies and LWOPs than any other district, and faces a critical issue of both human and financial resources to adequately represent clients facing these very serious charges. There are a limited number of qualified attorneys with the experience necessary to both handle the workload and provide the level of necessary representation. We must increase both our staff attorneys and contract attorneys to handle serious felonies. On all cases, the volume of evidence has increased, thereby increasing the overall workload demanded of all line attorneys, as well as technology and operational needs necessary.

Long-Term Critical Issue Areas and other External Factors (outside of your control) that Negatively Affect the Delivery of Services in Your District	Public defense in Louisiana continues to lack critical funding and resources to carry out its constitutionally mandated work, relying on "user-pay" conviction and user fees (CUF's) that continue a decade-long decline. For instance, in Fiscal Year 2013, OPD received \$1,726,613 in revenue from our local Traffic Court, and just \$247,453 from the same Court in Fiscal Year 2023. The State must increase direct funding for public defense in the overall budget to address this ongoing crisis. State and local funding for public defense is minimal when compared to that provided to District Attorneys. These disparities exist despite public defense being mandated by both federal and state constitutions. Additionally, funding for public defense reliant on revenue generated by Court fees creates the appearance of a conflict of interest with clients and our communities. OPD and other districts need resource equity, which should come from stable, reliable, and equitable sources, that does not shift the burden to our clients. In an effort to increase the overall level of representation, the State should continue supporting and advocating for local funding, especially in the larger metropolitan districts. OPD was able to address its drastic decrease in CUF's without restriction of services when New Orleans took a bold step and passed a public defender parity ordinance – pegging local funding for OPD to 85% of the local funding to the New Orleans District Attorney. This has allowed us to fill the gaps created by the decline in local fines and fees. However, it is critical that state funding not decrease because of increased local funding. As it applies to New Orleans, the City's intent is to supplement, not replace, state funding and its ongoing local funding is contingent that OPD's state-wide funding not decrease.
2023 Media Coverage and/or Major Accomplishments	2023 focused on increasing resources for public defense, particularly with the first official parity budget from the City of New Orleans. For the first time, OPD received equitable funding with the district attorney. Additionally, we continued work alongside local and state partners to push back against hostile crime narratives in the media, attempts to roll back criminal justice reforms, and increased aggressive prosecutorial practices. With the appointment and transition of a new Chief Defender, we prioritized introducing him to the community, as well as state and local decision makers, and media. We also worked with national public defender partners around the 60th anniversary of Gideon v Wainwright, and the RAND workload study and updated workload standards. DEVELOPMENT: We were once again selected as a host site for the Black Public Defender Association's Community Engagement Summer Fellowship. We were selected as a BYRNE JAG grant recipient to expand our peer mentorship work with formerly incarcerated people. Nearly two dozen of our attorneys were selected as LACDL Blackstone Award honorees for excellence in representation and advocacy. MEDIA: our work continues to be featured in local and national media outlets.

	In 2023, OPD continued to tackle recruiting, retention, and attrition by increasing salaries and benefits, hiring, and improving office culture, support and supervision. Due to increased local funding, OPD was able to fill vacant positions and increase pay for all staff, including increased first year attorney salary commensurate with statewide ADA salaries. Additionally in 2023, OPD focused on increased resources for contract conflict representation, increased representation in Municipal Court & Traffic Court, and improved client advocacy, including hiring people formerly incarcerated for more collaborative representation. We also continued technology and systems improvements to increase work efficiency, improve data storage and security, and drive down long term costs.			
What Changes Have You Implemented in Your District Office in 2023 That Have Improved the Delivery of Public Defender Services?	The work in 2023 has been at a break-neck pace. We had double the number of jury trials than previous years, filed numerous writs, and increased the over-all case resolutions. In addition, OPD doubled the number of clients served through our Client Services Division, improving case results by directly addressing client needs. We handled more than 500 substance use and/or mental health treatment referrals, which has provided alternatives to incarceration while improving overall public health and safety, and saving millions in jail costs. Some other 2023 initiatives included the work of OPD's Mental Health Unit, partnering with the District Attorney and the City to increase both pre- and post-arrest diversion options for our clients, and improvements in OPD's First Appearance Initiative. Lastly, with the appointment of a new Chief District Defender in 2023, OPD relied on long-serving staff with significant institutional knowledge to ensure the delivery of public defender services and partnerships with state and local partners throughout the transition remained consistent.




Criminal justice facilities have long been the de-facto treatment centers for individuals with poorly treated or untreated behavioral health conditions. The Louisiana Public Defender Board, its district offices, and the criminal justice system as a whole, dedicate a significant number of resources to defend, prosecute, and incarcerate individuals who would best be served by behavioral health treatment. The data is limited as to exactly how many of Louisiana's citizens are charged with juvenile, criminal, or Child in Need of Care infractions as a direct result of their behavioral health issues. There is no way to delineate the charges of a person arrested amid a mental health crisis, and many arrests made of individuals committing crime as a result of their addiction cannot be parsed out. While charge data does not allow us to determine the role that serious mental illness plays in justice system involvement, and likely grossly underrepresents the role of addiction in the criminal justice system, we can use charge data to establish the floor of criminal justice system involvement by members of our community who suffer from a behavioral health disorder. During Calendar Year 2023, the primary charge in 11.44% (168) of the 1,466 cases handled by the 42nd Judicial District Public Defender's Office was drug possession. Of these cases, 52.4% were charged with Possession of a Schedule II drug. Schedule II drugs include opiates, amphetamines, cocaine, and fentanyl.




The number of cases handled for drug possession charges does not give a clear picture of the impact of addiction on the criminal justice system. These numbers do not include arrests for crimes allegedly committed as a direct result of an individuals' addiction such as theft to support a habit, battery, DWI, and child endangerment or neglect. As LPDB seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.


TRAFFIC FILINGS CY14-CY22 (Source: La. Supreme Court Annual Report -- 2023 LASC Data Not yet available)



According to Supreme Court data, during 2022, traffic filings in the 42nd Judicial District decreased by 15% from the previous year. 2023 Supreme Court filing data is not yet available for comparison, however based on CUFs collections, filing rates are expected to be significantly greater than the previous year.



During Calendar Year 2023, the 42nd Judicial District Public Defender's Office (PDO) received \$447,630 in total revenues. Seventy-six percent of the office's revenues came from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 32%. CUFs are derived primarily from traffic tickets and special court costs. During 2023, revenues collected from CUFs more than doubled. The office did not receive funding from the city/parish government.
