RE: 2024 Annual Report of the Louisiana Public Defender Board

Speaker DeVillier, President Henry, members of the Louisiana legislature:

In 2024, the Louisiana Public Defender System represented over 146,000 people statewide through the efforts of over 880 public defenders and over 400 support staff without any waitlists in either capital or noncapital cases.

Louisiana needs a criminal justice system it can pay for and a reliable, renewable, sufficient funding source or sources independent of the state general fund with which to pay for it.

Towards that goal, the Louisiana Legislature provided some of the most significant and needed public defense reforms in state history. Act 22 reformed La. R.S. 15:141 *et seq.* ("The Louisiana Public Defender Act") by creating the "Office of the State Public Defender" ("OSPD") and abolishing the Louisiana Public Defender Board ("LPDB"). Act 22 shifted the regulatory, budgeting, and supervisory authority formerly exercised by the LPDB to the new OSPD. Act 22 created a new board to provide oversight for a few specifically identified areas.

Governor Jeff Landry appointed me the State Public Defender effective March 21, 2024. As the agency transitions to meet the mandates of Act 22, we are increasing our capacity to ensure compliance with laws and regulations in cost-effective and fiscally responsible ways.

Thank you for your leadership. I look forward to working with each of you and your colleagues toward our common goal of a criminal justice system that can operate properly for the benefit of all of Louisiana including the indigent people accused of crimes.

OSPD CY 2024 RECOMMENDATIONS FOR NEEDED CHANGES IN THE LAW

- 1) Amend all references to the "Louisiana Public Defender Board" in the law, replacing such references with "Office of the State Public Defender."
- 2) Creation of a stable, reliable, sufficient funding source for public defense.
 - a. Provide a stable, reliable, sufficient funding source for public defense, including resources to conduct investigative work, utilize experts, and seek appellate review. This would improve services provided to individuals charged with crimes or delinquent offenses and potentially decrease the likelihood of an innocent person being convicted of a crime.
 - b. Provide increased funding for indigent parent representation. Increased investment in parent representation will allow the State to access partial matching funds from Title IV-E, which now allows states to include parent and child representation in its funding claim.
- 3) Focus on non-carceral, rehabilitative interventions

We urge the legislature to review all laws that affect the criminal justice system with an eye toward de-emphasizing incarceration as a first, or only, option. Rather, we urge an emphasis on amending La.C.Cr.Pro. Articles 902 and 903 to provide tools and services that make Louisiana safer by reducing crime, improving lives, and creating productive citizens. These positive outcomes can come from a criminal justice system that focuses on exploring the roots of behaviors known to drive recidivism such as: undiagnosed/untreated mental health issues, untreated drug addiction, and lack of education/job skills.

Louisiana cannot incarcerate itself out of these problems. Further, focusing on incarceration alone subjects the State of Louisiana to increased costs. For example, when a person has untreated or undiagnosed schizophrenia or PTSD from military service and commits an offense, he should be treated appropriately for these conditions. Prisons, which are ill-equipped to deal with this type of issue, should not be a substitute for necessary mental health treatment. The same is true for people addicted to opioids or other substances. Prison does not provide the appropriate resources to fix the underlying problem. This in turn increases the likelihood that the individual will engage in future illegal activity, which contributes to the rate of recidivism. This suggests that the criminal justice system is not working for many of the offenders who enter the system. Our failure to address the underlying causes of incarceration results not only in economic costs but also negatively impacts the incarcerated individual's family, friends, and community. Together, we can address these drivers of recidivism and reduce the exorbitant costs of incarceration while building individuals into productive, well-adjusted citizens. This is perhaps the greatest opportunity for societal improvement and savings of public dollars in all of Louisiana.

Such a major improvement cannot be accomplished at the margins. We must reimagine the operation of the criminal justice system and re-prioritize the allocation of resources - away

from retributive interventions such as jails and prisons and towards rehabilitative interventions. We believe that this initiative will positively impact all corners of the criminal justice system, from defenders to judges, prosecutors, prison officials, probation officers, and the Louisiana citizenry at large.

- 4) Preserve state resources by eliminating the death penalty as a sentencing option in current and future cases, and provide for resentencing of inmates currently under a sentence of death to a life sentence. Cases with a possible death verdict are extraordinarily expensive to prosecute and defend, and if a sentence of death is imposed, expensive to house the person in prison.
- 5) Amend 15:529.1(c) to provide for a shortened cleansing time for prior convictions to be used to enhance sentences.
- 6) Eliminate life without parole sentences for offenses committed prior to the offender turning 17 years old.
- 7) Amend 39:100.210(C)(2)(c) to provide that any funds distributed to the Office of the State Public Defender through the vape tax be used to cover salary and benefits for district personnel.
- 8) Create a statute providing that no fees or bonds for costs shall be required for a criminal appeal or writ as long as the prisoner meets all requirements for proceeding in "forma pauperis."

As required by Louisiana Revised Statute 15:147(B)(20), OSPD is contracting with the University of Louisiana at Monroe (ULM) to conduct both in person and virtual training across the state. ULM has conducted 39 trainings in calendar year 2024.

The State Office conducted two District Financial Trainings that were attended by every District Defender and staff/contractors who handle the office's financial reporting. These trainings were held on the following dates:

- District Financial Training Part I (December 3, 2024)
- District Financial Training Part II (December 10, 2024)

The Juvenile Division conducted its own trainings this year. These were a mix of both virtual and in-person offerings, and included CINC/TPR Appeals (Zoom) on May 30, 2024 attended by 28 people and the in-person Adolescents in Foster Care Summit on July 24, 2024 in Baton Rouge, attended by 52.

- Evaluated technology needs through state annual reports and budget submissions.
- Managed a juvenile defender listsery to maximize cross-district learning and foster professional relationships among the defender community.
- Maintained a fully web-based Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP) communications system which allows displaced and mobile district management to e-message with statelevel officers, board members, and with each other from any computer or handheld device with internet access.

Rémy Voisin Starns (pronunciation of name is: **ray**'·me) is the State Public Defender. As the State Public Defender, Mr. Starns oversees the entire 64-parish public defense system in Louisiana which represents almost 88% of all persons accused of crimes statewide.

Prior to his appointment as State Public Defender, Mr. Starns was an assistant district attorney in Avoyelles Parish and practiced civil and criminal law in a wide range of matters in both state and federal court.

Mr. Starns graduated from LSU in 1993 with a Bachelor of Arts in political science with minors in Latin and Classical Civilization and lettered on the football team. Mr. Starns holds law degrees from Loyola University New Orleans School of Law and Tulane Law School.

OFFICE OF THE STATE PUBLIC DEFENDER CONTRACT PROGRAMS (CY24)

Public Defenders represent more than 142,000 people annually throughout the 42 districts and 64 parishes of Louisiana. The Office of the State Public Defender has a legislative mandate to provide representation, but it does not have the authority to provide direct client representation or hire public defender staff. The Office has contracted with eight private law firms, as permitted by La. R.S. 15:147 (C)(1), to represent indigent people in delinquency, capital, and appellate cases. In addition, the Office is required by La. R.S. 15:169 and 15:178 to appoint counsel for appellate and post-conviction cases in which a death sentence has been imposed at the trial level.

The OSPD's contracts with each program office contain provisions for monthly reporting to the OSPD and audits by the Legislative Auditor. They also provide for compliance with performance standards enforceable by the Office, and for termination of the contracts for failure to meet Office requirements. These requirements include adhering to the ethical rules of the Louisiana Supreme Court, violations of which may result in termination of the contracts.

The programs are as follows:

BATON ROUGE CAPITAL CONFLICT OFFICE (BRCCO)

Kyla Blanchard-Romanach is the Director of BRCCO. BRCCO employs the team approach to capital defense as required by the Capital Guidelines. The office includes a staff of attorneys, mitigation specialists, and investigators, thereby promoting cost-efficiency. The office is currently handling cases throughout the state in an effort to ensure that all defendants facing the death penalty are represented by certified counsel. On December 1, 2023 BRCCO merged with the District 19 (East Baton Rouge Parish) Office of the Public Defender creating capital capacity in that office.

CAPITAL DEFENSE PROJECT OF SOUTHEAST LOUISIANA (CDPSELA or CDP)

CDP is set up for the primary purpose of providing capital case defense representation to those persons accused of offenses for which the State of Louisiana may seek the death penalty as punishment if the person is found guilty of having committed a capital offense. CDP is led by its director, Kerry Cuccia. Originally, the primary responsibility of CDP was to handle cases in which the Orleans Public Defender Office (OPD) was excluded because of conflicts. However, CDP has provided and continues to provide representation for indigent clients facing the death penalty throughout the state.

CAPITAL POST-CONVICTION PROJECT OF LOUISIANA ("CPCPL" DBA MWALIMU CENTER OF JUSTICE)

This organization handles capital post-conviction representation of indigent defendants whose cases have progressed through the trial and appellate levels. CPCPL staff attorneys have successfully represented several clients whose cases were overturned for such reasons as ineffective assistance of counsel at the guilt and/or penalty phase of trial, failure by prosecutors to disclose important evidence, newly discovered evidence of innocence and evidence adduced as a

result of junk science. CPCPL also handles direct capital appeals when the Capital Appeals Project has a conflict of interest or there are co-defendants in a single case.

In 2020, Matilde Carbia took the helm at CPCPL. She and her staff work on as many cases as they can ethically handle at any particular time. The program also monitors cases in the pipeline in order to keep track of future needs.

THE LOYOLA CENTER FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE (CSJ) (formerly CAP)

The Center for Social Justice is based at Loyola University College of Law in New Orleans, Louisiana that provides capital appellate and post-conviction representation to indigent people on Louisiana's death row, as well as juveniles facing sentences of life without parole. CSJ is the sole office that handles capital appeals for the state as well as conflict and necessary capital post-conviction representation. CSJ additionally is tasked with representing clients in their *Montgomery* hearings. CSJ staff include attorneys, mitigation specialists and investigators. CSJ provides high-quality representation to a full caseload of clients in state courts throughout Louisiana, with the assistance of students at Loyola, and seeks to train the next generation of capital defenders.

LOUISIANA APPELLATE PROJECT (LAP)

Christopher Aberle is the director of the Louisiana Appellate Project. The LAP provides appellate representation for indigent defendants in all non-capital felony appeals arising from all of the districts. The LAP also represents youths in appeals of felony-grade delinquency adjudications. The Office of the State Public Defender has contracted with the LAP to provide these appellate services for the district offices.

LOUISIANA CAPITAL ASSISTANCE CENTER (LCAC)

LCAC is a not-for-profit law office specializing in representing indigent capital defendants. Founded 30 years ago, the LCAC has served poor people in Louisiana facing capital prosecutions or execution throughout that time.

LCAC provides direct services statewide, representing indigent capital defendants following arrest all the way through trial, as well as providing representation at motion for new trial and on direct appeal as needed. Pursuant to its contract, LCAC also serves as resource counsel to provisionally certified defense lawyers pursuant to Capital Defense Guideline 915(G)(2). This service is essential to educating, mentoring, and overseeing the work of provisionally certified counsel to ensure the delivery of quality legal representation and the growth of a new generation of capital defenders. LCAC provides general support services to other organizations and often is able to ameliorate crises faced by counsel. Over its three decades of work in Louisiana, LCAC also has a strong record of supporting the work of local defenders tasked with capital representation.

Richard Bourke serves as director of LCAC and employs a staff of lawyers, mitigation specialists, and investigators. In addition to its direct representation, the program provides leadership, mentoring, and guidance to the capital defense community. LCAC has influenced capital

representation after the restoration of the death penalty in the South. Based on its reputation, LCAC attracts interns, law students, and lawyers from around the world to volunteer their services to LCAC and its clients.

LOUISIANA CENTER FOR CHILDREN'S RIGHTS (LCCR)

OSPD contracts with The Louisiana Center for Children's Rights (LCCR) to handle *Miller v. Alabama* cases and *Montgomery v. Louisiana* cases and also juvenile delinquency cases in Orleans Parish. The contract with LCCR ended on June 30, 2024. Going forward those cases will be handled by the individual district public defender offices.

INNOCENCE PROJECT NEW ORLEANS (IPNO)

The Office of the State Public Defender has a contract for partial funding of the Innocence Project New Orleans (IPNO) which, since its inception in 2001, has won the freedom or exoneration of 46 wrongfully convicted individuals who collectively spent more than 1,132 years in prison for crimes they did not commit. IPNO is one of the most successful innocence organizations in the country. IPNO also advocates for systemic changes to decrease the risk of wrongful convictions. The Executive Director of IPNO is Jee Park.

LOUISIANA WRIT SERVICE (LaWS)

The OSPD contracts with attorneys to take writs in the appropriate courts of Appeal and the Louisiana Supreme Court.

- Developed and successfully submitted the FY26 \$50.9M OSPD budget to the Division of Administration
- Contracted with DCFS for Title IV-E federal funding for special juvenile related projects
- Awarded \$74K+ LCLE to fund a financial auditor contract position to enhance the SPD's oversight capacity

- Continuously monitored district case and financial data entry into the state office's database
- Conducted numerous on-site, zoom and live court observation compliance inquiries of district offices following the office's Comprehensive Site Visit Protocol

- Produced and published via email the SPD's monthly newsletter online from January through December
- Organized, facilitated, and moderated the zoom-based statewide financial management database training in December

Budget Report

The appropriation for FY24 was \$51,463,845. Additionally, the State Public Defender Rémy Starns (SPD) secured the following grants during Calendar Year 2024:

- 1. Office of Justice Programs (OJP), U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) awarded OSPD a grant under the funding opportunity entitled Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Enhancing Juvenile Indigent Defense, in the amount of \$425,381 over a three-year period. The grant period is from October 1, 2024, through September 30, 2027. For FY25, we have budgeted \$75,823 for this program.
- 2. The Department of Children and Family Services contracts with OSPD to allow public defenders access to federal Title IV-E reimbursement for the claimable expenses for representing parents. This program started in 2020 following a change in the federal regulations governing Title IV-E claims that redefined "foster care expenses" to include representation for children and parents. We anticipate receiving approximately \$ 750,000 in federal funds in FY25, which are used to support an appellate unit for CINC and TPR cases and multidisciplinary projects in several districts.
- 3. The Louisiana Commission on Law Enforcement (LCLE) awarded OSPD a grant in the amount of \$74,999 for a financial auditor to review and assist districts in completing their monthly financial reports.

To date, all grant activities including timely and accurate submission of monthly billing have been completed.

Our appropriated budget for FY25 was \$48,085,365. The Joint Legislative Committee on the Budget gave OSPD approval to carry-forward funds from FY24 in the amount of \$757,438. OSPD's current FY25 existing operating budget is \$48,842,803.

The SPD submitted the FY26 OSPD operating budget request to the State of Louisiana's Office of Planning and Budget on November 1, 2024. The budget request for FY26, which begins July 1, 2025, is \$50,986,132. Included in the request is an increase to the Louisiana Public Defender Fund of \$2.1M (million) (rounded) which includes a \$1.3M increase to the District Assistance Fund.

Compliance - Trial-Level Report

Pursuant to La. R.S. 15:157, the Trial-Level Compliance Officer (TLCO) is responsible for coordinating oversight efforts of the State Office. Michael A. Mitchell continues to perform the duties of the Trial Level Compliance Officer for the State Office.

In CY24, TLCO continues to monitor database compliance. The continuing goal is to obtain accurate figures on the numbers and types of cases handled in each district and assist District Chiefs in monitoring the frequency of visits with incarcerated clients. Additionally, State Office

staff, in partnering with District Chiefs and their staff, worked tirelessly to account for all cases within the database, whether active or closed. We continue to significantly improve data collection and accountability through a joint effort and cooperation.

Staff use a variety of tools to monitor compliance in the field, including frequent visits to the district offices, database review, telephone, and Zoom communication, and the State Office's Comprehensive Site Visit Protocol. These protocols include a combination of database and reporting review, court observation, file review, employee and stakeholder surveys, input, and interviews with the District Defender and district office staff.

Pursuant to La. R.S. 15:148(4) and Office policy, TLCO Mitchell reviewed, investigated, and responded to client complaints received from districts statewide.

Pursuant to La. R.S.15:147(B)(20) and Office Policy, the SPD has contracted with University of Louisiana at Monroe (ULM) to create a program to continue the extensive training program. ULM provided the delivery of experienced legal information dissemination by seasoned legal professionals in the form of frequent training sessions for district line defenders. ULM employed a cast of seasoned attorneys to lead these training sessions. Additionally, ULM has divided the state into seven (7) Regions and has elicited the assistance of seasoned attorneys from each region to assist the instructor in leading these sessions. These training courses may range from database training to Jury Selection. ULM hosted a variety of live and remote trainings. Thirty-one of the forty-two districts in the State sent at least one defender to at least one ULM training.

The Office of the State Public Defender presented two district Financial Trainings via Zoom on December 3 and 10, 2024 with 136 participants in attendance for each training.

Information and Technology Management (ITM) Report

In Calendar Year 2024, between January 4th and February 1st, the SPD and ITM Division spearheaded the production and dissemination of the State Public Defender's (SPD) 700+ page Annual Report to the Legislature in collaboration with the entire staff as well as all 42 district offices of the public defenders. Each district office produced three reports to the staff providing a summary of each district office's physical, fiscal, and human resources and procedures - all due to the State Public Defender between January 10th and 15th so that the proofreading, layout and formatting, printing, binding and digital dissemination could be completed by the February 1st deadline set by statute. Also, the SPD staff produced a 48-page overview of the agency and individual divisional reports as well as numerous other statewide reports on client counts, cases and charges counts, and fiscal activity. Despite the extremely tight deadline, the report had been considered by the Division of Administration (DoA) as the "Gold Standard of Annual Reports" among state agencies for several years running.

In the 2024 calendar year, under the direction of the State Public Defender, the ITM Officer Dr. Erik Stilling, and the ITM Division staff continued the development of several on-going projects and initiated several new projects, some of which are still under development.

Most notably, the ITM Division completed the "de-bugging" highly customized defenderData Version 7.0 Case Management System and Financial Management System. This was done in large part through the ITM staff's weekly meetings with the project leaders of the software vendor, JusticeWorks, and district office staff, tweaking and polishing existing functionalities as well as producing entirely new features. In August 2024, the ITM Division presented a Zoom-based training for district-level database users and in November 2024, the division participated in a statewide in-person training at the Public Defenders Association of Louisiana's (PDAL) annual meeting in Lake Charles.

The staff developed numerous graphically illustrated tutorials on various features of the database including compensation reporting, harassment prevention reporting, harassment incident reporting, pro forma budgeting and final budgeting (among other topics) and presented trainings to users on these database features and made presentations on these in a series of trainings conducted by the OSPD on December 3 and 10, 2024.

Also, staff deployed the new single-page data entry feature for Capital Program Office data collection and a detailed Capital Case Monthly Report which was developed in collaboration with Dr. Tiffany Simpson (the agency's Legislative Liaison), Mr. Michael Mitchell, and several district chief district defenders.

The office worked closely with Dr. Tiffany Simpson, the Legislative Liaison/Special Projects Director, who spearheaded the development and deployment of the new OSPD website, particularly providing digital artwork and technological support.

ITM worked closely with the State Public Defender, the Trial-Level Compliance Officer and other OSPD executives in the maintenance of a tracking system for O-level funding requests and disbursements. Additionally, ITM staff has helped implement the statewide monthly newsletter under the direction of the State Public Defender and the Legislative Liaison Officer.

Also, the ITM director worked closely with the State Public Defender, Mr. Rémy Starns, to develop a uniform and methodical compensation scale for District Defenders and conducted over three dozen meetings with individual District Defenders on this scale at numerous locations around the state.

As directed by the SPD, ITM staff continually monitored post-Pandemic losses of CUFs through comparative analyses with pre-Pandemic CY19 and CY21 data contrasted against LASC Annual Report data regarding charge filings for the past decade. The SPD also continually monitored district office finances through ITM monthly solvency analyses as well as various ad hoc analyses to resolve specific issues arising in individual district offices.

In addition to these projects, ITM has a broad array of responsibilities falling under the headings of Information Management, as well as Technology Development, Deployment and Management, and Program Development and Resource Management. Per the requirements of the Public Defender Act, the SPD implemented online or automated technologies to assist district-level management with uniform reporting on financial, personnel compensation, harassment prevention

training and incident reporting, and budget requests, as well as programs and technologies to promote state and local-level data-driven decision-making.

The SPD facilitates data-driven decision-making by providing real-time feedback analytics on the attorneys' and district offices' caseload, workload, case outcomes, and financial and personnel compensation data. Such analytics enhance decision-making for the district offices, and the SPD. This is all done completely online using a cloud-based system with continuously updated online security measures, housed in a secure location with bio-scan physical access procedures to protect the clients' information and the attorneys' work product. ITM also maintains the public-facing StatePublicDefender.LA.GOV website as well as two secure back-end websites which are used as support platforms for annual report data collection, and for the real-time analytics feedback system called the Dashboard Reporting Center. This system provides instantaneous financial and case-related analyses for each chief district defender and for the SPD and his executive staff. The ITM Division also provides training for new District Defenders in the use of these technologies and conducts periodic online and on-site training for district office staff and line attorneys, provides a helpdesk for telephone and email troubleshooting and training, and reviews database updates and improvements per users' suggestions.

Juvenile Report

The 2024 calendar year saw many changes at the Office of Juvenile Justice. With a new governor/administration, changes throughout the Louisiana Juvenile Justice System began to take place quickly. It was very clear that the State's crime issue was one of the first issues that the new administration planned to address. Legislative sessions were quickly scheduled and the social and political landscape surrounding juvenile justice began its transformation.

The Office of Juvenile Justice welcomed a new Deputy Secretary this year. Mr. Kenneth "Kenny" Loftin brought a wealth of experience and passion for positive change to the agency. Mr. Lofton expanded the agency's services, including establishing a group home for youth and implementing an intensive residential treatment program.

In May of this year, the Office of Juvenile Justice opened the new Swanson Center for Youth at Monroe, Louisiana. This new facility was designed in accordance with ACT 693, exemplifying a Tier-1 secure setting dedicated to providing intensive rehabilitative services. The facility accommodates 72 youth individualized rooms, to demonstrate a commitment to safety for the youth housed in the facility. The innovative facility features a transitional treatment unit that offers specialized, one-on-one services to enhance social skills for successful integration into lower-tier facilities' general populations, while also enhancing its rehabilitative capabilities.

The new leadership and opening of the new facility have resolved some issues such as the housing of juveniles at the Jackson Parish facility, which became an issue after the closure of the controversial Bridge City Center for Youth – West Feleciana facility. Currently, the Office of Juvenile Justice reports that it no longer houses youth adjudicated to its custody at the Jackson Parish facility. Unfortunately, there remains an issue with placing youth adjudicated to the Office of Juvenile Justice, due to the lack of available beds and/or staff/employee shortages.

The Office of Juvenile Justice also announced the grand opening of its newest facility, the Louisiana Multi-Agency Resource Center (LaMARC), in Lafayette, Louisiana. LaMARC's mission is to enhance public safety and reduce formal involvement in the juvenile justice system through early intervention, comprehensive assessments, and coordinated access to a wide range of critical services for underserved youth. The center provides a coordinated approach to youth services, ensuring that all needs are met, and local care systems can efficiently and effectively manage community resources in Lafayette Parish. The center provides a non-threatening and inclusive environment, which also welcomes parents and youth seeking information or services outside the formal system.

In May of 2024, Tina Dennis Darensbourg stepped into the role as Director of Juvenile Defender Services, replacing Richard Pittman, as he accepted employment with the Louisiana State University Paul M. Hebert Law Center, as Director of Field Placements and Pro Bono Programs. Prior to Richard's transition to LSU Law Center, he organized the 2nd Annual Office of the State Public Defender Summit Training for Juvenile Defenders and Juvenile Attorneys. The training was a success, and we hosted 52 attorney attendees. The training focused on Adolescents in Foster Care and next year, we plan to continue to develop our juvenile attorneys' skills, to maximize quality and effective representation for our juveniles in our state.

In line with the new administrative changes in the state juvenile system, the State of Louisiana successfully reversed the "Raise the Age" legislation." Currently, 17-year-olds can now be considered adults when facing criminal charges. The law was passed to target teen violence; however, the law negatively affects our youth by also allowing 17-year-olds to be charged as adults for lesser offenses. Additionally, Senate Bill No. 1/Act No. 2 is headed to the polls for the statewide election to be held on March 29, 2025. This act appears to potentially provide for the elimination of courts such as juvenile courts and allow for the establishment of specialized courts within the district courts to handle juvenile matters. If the citizens of this state vote to make this change in the law, the days of allowing second chances for juveniles and rehabilitation for our youth may be at risk of extinction.

On a positive note, the Juvenile Division applauds the successes of our CINC Appellate Project. In 2024, the project continues to see an increase in the number of consultations and appeals. All the Title IV-E projects, including projects in specific districts, remain in effect and continue to thrive in assisting in the Child in Need of Care caseloads in the districts. The program handled eleven CINC Appeals during the calendar year.

The Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice, approved the application by the formerly named Louisiana Public Defender Board, now the Office of the State Public Defender, for an award under the Office of Justice Programs funding opportunity entitled "OJJDP FY20 Enhancing Juvenile Indigent Defense." The approved award amount is \$445,248 and is for the project entitled "East Baton Rouge Advanced Advocacy Project".

The East Baton Rouge Advanced Advocacy Project is an actual Phase 2 expansion of the original project, a joint partnership between the East Baton Rouge Office of the Public Defender and the sub-grantee, the Louisiana Center for Children's Rights. Phase 2 will allow the Advanced Advocacy project to address major gaps that hinder its ability to serve more children in the East

Baton Rouge district. It will add a paralegal to improve the coordination between attorney and social worker teams, while minimizing the required case-related administrative task for attorneys. Phase 2 also adds an investigator/intake specialist to streamline the intake/social work referral process and increase capacity for a more robust investigatory fieldwork. The project's ultimate goals are to: realize its originally envisioned capacity to serve 250 children annually; further reduce East Baton Rouge's juvenile prison population; increase social work support; increase case support with field investigation findings; and decrease the number of clients adjudicated or convicted of new offenses during representation.

The new Director of Juvenile Defender Services continues to participate in a number of juvenile justice and child welfare stakeholder groups during the year, including the Pelican Center Training & Education Committee, the Children Justice Act Task Force, the CARE Advisory Committee for the Court Improvement Project, the Children's Code Committee of the Louisiana Law Institute, the Child Protection Representation Commission, the Human Trafficking Prevention Commission, and the Juvenile Justice Reform Act Implementation Commission.

Training Report

The largest in-person training was the Adolescents in Foster Care Summit in July of 2024. A total of 52 defenders attended the event. The Juvenile Division presented the following:

Capital Report

Michael A. Mitchell, Trial Level Compliance Officer, oversees the capital program governed by the State Office for CY24. The State Office administers the Capital Expert Witness Fund. The process for accessing funding from the State Office involves the completion and submission of an Expert Witness Funding Application to the State Office. Rémy Voisin Starns, State Public Defender, convenes a weekly meeting with the Trial Level Compliance Officer, a member of the Capital and Compliance Division support staff, and the Attorney or Program Director who is requesting funding approval to be determined based on needs and availability. Each meeting included either in-person or phone conferences with the program offices to discuss the funding requests.

There are currently 20 open, indicted, indigent capital cases being handled by Capital Programs and there is no wait list.































DISTRICT REPORTS DATA COLLECTION METHODOLOGY (CY24)

This methodology discussion covers the techniques employed to help the district offices produce their annual reports. These district reports are required per R.S.15:174, which provides that each district defender is required to submit to OSPD a detailed annual report on the "workload, resources, employees, and expenditures for each district for the previous fiscal year." The following 42 individual district reports cover each individual Office of the Public Defenders regarding several factors: basic office information, district structures, caseload information, and budget information. This information is reported to OSPD by the District Defenders to the best of their knowledge and belief at the time of the submission.

Preceding each district's report is an executive summary produced by OSPD staff using the self-reported information from each district as well as OSPD analytics, including: information regarding the total numbers of Felonies, Misdemeanors, Delinquencies and Child in Need of Care cases; Conviction and User's Fees (CUFs), State Funding, Local Funding, and Other Funding (federal, corporate or philanthropic funds) over the past three years. These district report executive summaries are analytics based on each district's self-reported information on their caseload and fiscal activity and can vary in part due to their differing local procedures and environments.

Following the executive summary is the first section of each district report. This is a narrative produced by district offices which lists: basic contact information, including emergency contact information; listing of local government cash and in-kind support; descriptions of the structure of the local office and the local criminal justice system, including key figures in the local system; and the supervisory structure of the district public defenders' office. With the exception of the district's population statistics, these data are self-reported by the districts through the web-based annual survey questionnaire distributed to each District Defender near year's end. Population data is captured using the U.S. Census Bureau estimates.

The second section reports caseloads for each district, aggregating new and pending cases (from prior years) and outcomes of charges disposed in CY24. These data are also self-reported by the district offices, gathered through each district's data entry in the case management system. The data are collected throughout the year by each attorney or the attorney's designee through data entry to the OSPD online database. In 2011, the agency purchased a new case management system for the districts and deployed it in June 2011. Data from an earlier database preceding June 2011 (as far back as 2007) was converted and migrated into the new database from the old database also in June of 2011. Data are reported on new cases received in the year of report, cases from prior years which were closed that year, cases from prior years which were still active that year, and the total of new and pending cases for the year of the report. Some cases listed as pending have been open for several years yet have been periodically reviewed by the districts to ensure these are truly still open cases, noting that complex cases such as juvenile, felony, capital and life without parole (LWOP) cases may indeed remain active even after several years or may have been declared dormant for some time (thus not counted in workloads or caseloads) but had been re-opened during

the year of the report (e.g., fugitive cases re-opened months or even years later when the client is found).

It is important to note that the database periodically, automatically changes the status from any of the several active statuses to "Auto-dormant" for every case which has sat idly untouched in the database for excessive periods of time in order to discount cases which are accidently left UNCLOSED. Cases which are in fugitive or other inactive statuses or in auto-dormant status, or which have not been reviewed periodically and confirmed as active cases are EXCLUDED from the case counts that support caseload analyses. Further, cases untouched for excessive periods of time are set to a status of "Auto-Closed" signifying that the case is not to be counted as part of a workload or caseload, but have not been officially disposed by the Court or DA and yet are unlikely to be re-opened at a later date—although it IS possible to do so. These measures help ensure the accuracy of case counts and guard against overcounting.

Additionally, data are reported in this annual report regarding the disposition of charges in a manageable number of very broad categories for presentation purposes, with labels such as "Guilty as Charged," "Dismissed" and "Plea to Lesser Charge," for example, each of which include numerous nuanced outcomes similar and relevant to these broad labels. Nonetheless, the disposition data reported give a useful graphic impression of the outcomes of cases and charges. Given the February 1, 2025 deadline for submission of this Calendar Year 2024 annual report, a small number of case closings and pending cases may not be completely up to date. This is particularly true for cases handled very near the end of the calendar year, as the time-lag between case activity at year's end and case data entry may preclude some small amount of activity from being entered in time for this report.

The District CY24 Financial Summary Tables, the third and final section of the districts' reports, address revenues and expenditures by individual line item in a very granular fashion. All information contained in this section of the districts' reports was compiled automatically through the Financial Management System (FMS) component of the OSPD database. This was done through the online FMS report query using data from each district's monthly financial reports for the year of the annual report. These data were submitted online to the OSPD by the individual Public Defender Offices monthly and reviewed by OSPD's staff monthly. All monthly reports since August 2012 have been reported online, and all prior hard-copy monthly reports from 2008 through 2012 were converted to digital data and migrated into the database.

"Revenues" include the statutorily mandated Conviction and Users' Fees (CUFs), as well as several other statutorily mandated fees, and "Other" funding sources such as federal, private, or corporate grants, or donations, and in a very few districts, local special or general appropriations from local governments, and in District 19, a modest tax from car rentals. These are reported in this third and final section and show the actual amounts of state funding received in the calendar year regardless of which fiscal year the funds were appropriated. To report the amount of fiscal-

year state funds actually received by a district on a calendar year basis, the state revenue portion of the financial summaries were computed by adding all the District Assistance Funds, along with all other emergency or supplemental state funds disbursed to the district office between January 1st and December 31st of 2024 (i.e., the second half of FY24, January to June, and the first half of FY25, July to December).

While the data reported herein are believed and known to be accurate at the time of this writing, should the need for any corrections become evident in the future, changes will be made in the database and will be reflected in future reports.








In 2024, the 1st Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$3,787,327 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, only 27% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). 68% of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance. The office also received \$203,000 in local revenues.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 29% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024. As costs have risen due to inflation and increased attorney fees, CUF collections have not kept up, increasing the office's reliance on other funding streams.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues

In 2024, the 1st Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$203,000 in local revenues from the Caddo Parish Commission. These funds were specifically dedicated to be used to contract with additional attorneys in District Court.


The office also receives in-kind support from the District and Juvenile Courts in Caddo Parish, as well as Shreveport City Court in the form of office space at each courthouse.

The failure of the public defender's system unstable funding stream has resulted in an increased reliance on state supplemental assistance for solvency in Caddo Parish. During Calendar Year 2024, the office received state funding totaling nearly 75% of the office's expenditures. State supplemental assistance has increased each of the last two years as the office's expenses have increased because of inflation and increased attorney costs.




In 2024, the 2nd Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$588,716 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, 41% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), which exceeds the statewide average of 31%. Fifty-eight percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance.

CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.


What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 45.5% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024.



As the Office of the State Public Defender seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. 

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). 
Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues



Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues




In 2024, the 5th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$675,407 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, 46% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), which exceeds the statewide average of 31%. Fifty-four percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance.


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 47% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues



During Calendar Year 2024, the 5th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender represented 1,547 individuals in 1,717 total cases. Undoubtedly, a significant portion of the cases handled during 2024 were rooted in the effects of Louisiana's mental health and substance abuse crises. As the Office of the State Public Defender seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.




In 2024, the 6th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$619,371.77 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, 59% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), which exceeds the statewide average of 31%. Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 59% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues






In 2024, the 7th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$460,170 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, only 26% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). Seventy-four percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 25.5% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024. As costs have risen due to inflation and increased attorney fees, CUF collections have not kept up, increasing the office's reliance on other funding streams.


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues

The 7th district did not receive local funding during CY2024, however the district did receive in-kind donations from the local police juries in the form of office space.





Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to State Funding




The failure of the public defender's system unstable funding stream has resulted in an increased reliance on state supplemental assistance for solvency in Catahoula and Concordia Parishes. During Calendar Year 2024, the office received state funding totaling 72% of the office's expenditures.




Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 24% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024. As costs have risen due to inflation and increased attorney fees, CUF collections have not kept up, increasing the office's reliance on other funding streams.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues






In 2024, the 10th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$599,776 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, 40% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), compared to the statewide average of 31%. Sixty percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance.


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs



Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 41% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024. As costs have risen due to inflation and increased attorney fees, CUF collections have not kept up, increasing the office's reliance on other funding streams.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues



The failure of the public defender's system unstable funding stream has resulted in an increased reliance on state supplemental assistance for solvency in Natchitoches Parish. During Calendar Year 2024, the office received state funding totaling nearly 61% of the office's expenditures. State supplemental assistance has increased each of the last two years as the office's expenses have increased because of inflation and increased attorney costs.

During Calendar Year 2024, the 10th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender represented 915 individuals in 1,598 total cases. Undoubtedly, a significant portion of the cases handled during 2024 were rooted in the effects of Louisiana's mental health and substance abuse crises. As the Office of the State Public Defender seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.

Attorneys are encouraged to file motions for preliminary examination, bond reduction and discovery as soon as they receive their appointment notices. 
Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs



Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues






Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues




In 2024, the 13th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$844,755 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, 54% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), which exceeds the statewide average of 31%. Forty-six percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 59% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024.

In 2024, the 13th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender did not receive any local funding or in-kind support from the local government.


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues




In 2024, the 14th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$3,334,664 in total revenues. Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues

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


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to State Funding




In 2024, the 16th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$2,379,252 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, 35% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), which exceeds the statewide average of 31%. Sixty-four percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 36.2% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024.

In 2024, the 16th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender did not receive any local funding or in-kind support from the local governments within the district.


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to State Funding




The failure of the public defender's system unstable funding stream has resulted in an increased reliance on state supplemental assistance for solvency in the district.

During Calendar Year 2024, the office received state funding totaling 67% of the office's expenditures. State supplemental assistance has increased each of the last two years as the office's expenses have increased because of inflation and increased attorney costs.



Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 37% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024. As costs have risen due to inflation and increased attorney fees, CUF collections have not kept up, increasing the office's reliance on other funding streams.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues



The failure of the public defender's system unstable funding stream has resulted in an increased reliance on state supplemental assistance for district solvency.

During Calendar Year 2024, the office received state funding totaling 74% of the office's expenditures. State supplemental assistance has increased each of the last two years as the office's expenses have increased because of inflation and increased attorney costs.

During Calendar Year 2024, the 17th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender represented 2,612 individuals in 5,153 total cases. Undoubtedly, a significant portion of the cases handled during 2024 were rooted in the effects of Louisiana's mental health and substance abuse crises. As the Office of the State Public Defender seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs



Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues



Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to State Funding





Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 21% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024. CUF collections have not kept up with expenditures, increasing the office's reliance on other funding streams. *Please note that some data provided by





Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to State Funding






In 2024, the 20th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$466,477 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, 45% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), which exceeds the statewide average of 31%. Fifty-one percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance. Office expenditures exceeded the district's total revenues for the year.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 41.8% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024.






Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues









Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues







We are performing services with monthly court funded contributions totaling \$50,000 per year per contractual arrangement. Through this specialty court, participation in which is a special condition of probation, offenders will be judicially supervised and will be provided community services, including mental health treatment, to prevent the recurrence of behaviors that lead to justice system involvement.

Short Term Critical Issue Areas	The Public Defender office is currently dealing with a substantial increase in caseloads due both to the aftermath of the pandemic and a recent spike in homicides. We are in desperate need of additional attorneys in order to provide effective representation for our clients. Resolution of this problem will require additional funding in order to attract new attorneys and to provide appropriate salaries and benefits for current attorneys and staff to avoid attrition.




In 2024, the 23rd Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$1,708,609 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, 45% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), which exceeds the statewide average of 31%. Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

Conviction and User Fees accounted for 52.8% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024.

In 2024, the 23rd District Office of the Public Defender did not receive funding from the local governments or criminal justice system.

However, the office receives in-kind support in the form of office space within the courthouse in Assumption, Ascension, and St. James Parishes


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues




In 2024, the 24th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$4,303,381 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, 47% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), which exceeds the statewide average of 31%. Forty-seven percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

In 2024, the 24th District Office purchased its office space for roughly \$1,000,000. This purchase was made from the district's fund balance without assistance from the Building & Renovation Fund, thus making it difficult to discern the proportion of general office expenditures that were paid by CUFs. Typically CUFs cover about 50% of the office's expenses.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues






In 2024, the 25th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$567,468 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, 42% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), which exceeds the statewide average of 31%. Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

In the 25th District, nearly 62% of the office's expenditures are accounted for by CUFs in CY 2024.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues




In 2024, the 25th District Office of the Public Defender did not receive funding from the local government.




In 2024, the 26th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$2,913,367 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, only 33% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). Sixty-seven percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance.


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs



Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 36% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024. As costs have risen due to inflation and increased attorney fees, CUF collections have not kept up, increasing the office's reliance on other funding streams.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues




In 2024, the 26th District Office of the Public Defender did not receive funding from the local governments or criminal justice system.

The failure of the public defender's system unstable funding stream has resulted in an increased reliance on state supplemental assistance for district solvency. During Calendar Year 2024, the office received state funding totaling 75% of the office's expenditures. State supplemental assistance has increased each of the last two years as the office's expenses have increased because of inflation and increased attorney costs.

During Calendar Year 2024, the 26th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender represented 6,530 individuals in 15,974 total cases. Undoubtedly, a significant portion of the cases handled during 2024 were rooted in the effects of Louisiana's mental health and substance abuse crises. As the Office of the State Public Defender seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.



Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues




Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to State Funding



Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs







Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs









Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs










In 2024, the 32nd Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$1,578,366.90 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, 47% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), which exceeds the statewide average of 31%. Fifty-three percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 50.5% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024.

In 2024, the 32nd District Office of the Public Defender did not receive funding from the local governments or criminal justice system.

However, the office receives in-kind support in the form of payment of the office's phone bill by the Terrebonne Parish government.


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to State Funding



The failure of the public defender's system unstable funding stream has resulted in an increased reliance on state supplemental assistance for district solvency.

During Calendar Year 2024, the office received state funding totaling nearly 57% of the office's expenditures. The difference between 2023 and 2024 state funding is largely accounted for by a one time payment made to the district in 2023 from the Building & Renovation Fund. The state office reimbursed the district funds that were spent from its fund balance to purchase their office space.

During Calendar Year 2024, the 32nd Judicial District Office of the Public Defender represented 2,676 individuals in 5,704 total cases. Undoubtedly, a significant portion of the cases handled during 2024 were rooted in the effects of Louisiana's mental health and substance abuse crises. As the Office of the State Public Defender seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.






Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs






Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to State Funding








In 2024, the 35th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$443,534.83 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, only 29% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). Seventy percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance.


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 33% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024. As costs have risen due to inflation and increased attorney fees, CUF collections have not kept up, increasing the office's reliance on other funding streams.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues



The failure of the public defender's system unstable funding stream has resulted in an increased reliance on state supplemental assistance for district solvency.

During Calendar Year 2024, the office received state funding totaling nearly 80% of the office's expenditures. State supplemental assistance has increased each of the last two years. In 2023, the office received additional state support from the Building & Renovation Fund to purchase its office space from the previous District Defender. Additional support was also required in 2024 as the office's expenses have increased because of inflation and increased attorney costs.

During Calendar Year 2024, the 35th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender represented 723 individuals in 995 total cases. Undoubtedly, a significant portion of the cases handled during 2024 were rooted in the effects of Louisiana's mental health and substance abuse crises. As the Office of the State Public Defender seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.



Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs










Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs








In 2024, the 38th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$63,891 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, 91% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), which significantly exceeds the statewide average of 31%. Only eight percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

In the 38th District, while CUF collections account for 91% of the district's funding, they only account for 52.6% of the office's expenses.

In 2024, the 38th District Office of the Public Defender did not receive funding from the local governments or criminal justice system.




Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to State Funding



The failure of the public defender's system unstable funding stream that has resulted in an increased reliance on state supplemental assistance for solvency in jurisdictions across the state, has led to the 38th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender receiving limited supplemental state assistance.

State resources have gone towards ensuring solvency in other parts of the state. During Calendar Year 2024, the office received state funding totaling only 4.6% of the office's expenditures. The difference between total revenues and expenditures was covered by the district's fund balance.




In 2024, the 39th Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$202,876.72 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, only 14% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). Eighty-five percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 17% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024. The office is reliant on other funding streams to meet it's expenses.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues




Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.

What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 36.9% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024. As costs have risen due to inflation and increased attorney fees, CUF collections have not kept up, increasing the office's reliance on other funding streams.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues






In 2024, the 41st Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$16,209,267 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, only 10% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). Twenty- one percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance. The office receives a significant appropriation from the City of New Orleans which accounts for 69% of the office's funding.


Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to CUFs




Louisiana's Public Defense System is intended to be funded primarily by Conviction and User Fees (CUFs). CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.


What was intended to serve as the primary funding source for public defenders only accounted for 10.9% of the office's expenditures in CY 2024. As costs have risen due to inflation and increased attorney fees, CUF collections have not kept up, increasing the office's reliance on other funding streams.

Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to Local Revenues






Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to State Funding

During Calendar Year 2024, the 41st Judicial District Office of the Public Defender represented 11,508 individuals in 18,727 total cases. Undoubtedly, a significant portion of the cases handled during 2024 were rooted in the effects of Louisiana's mental health and substance abuse crises. As the Office of the State Public Defender seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.

OPD continues to confront very high workloads with work happening at a breakneck pace. In 2024, OPD handled more cases with the addition of Troop NOLA. the Attorney General's new Orleans prosecutorial office, numerous legislative changes, including the rollback of Raise the Age, and an increasing crisis at the jail due to overcrowding. OPD covers 28 sections across three different courts in Orleans Parish. In addition to the thousands of cases we touch each year, we have some of the highest numbers of serious felony cases where someone faces a life or virtual life sentence. The Louisiana State Police added a dedicated New Orleans patrol, Troop NOLA. This additional police presence has increased our overall number of clients, cases, and workload. Also, the Attorney General's Office added a dedicated New Orleans office. This is an additional prosecutorial entity (in addition to the City Attorney and District Attorney offices) where OPD is responsible for representing clients. As can be seen in our caseload reports, we have seen a significant increase in new misdemeanor and felony cases over the year. 2024 has seen a truly drastic increase in the number of trials - especially complex jury trials. We have nearly tripled the number of judge and jury trials than in years past. While this has increased the experience and expertise of our case teams, and netted a number of positive results for clients, it has also exhausted attorneys and case teams who were already spread especially thin.

The crisis in overcrowding at the Orleans Justice Center, and its impact on our clients and their cases, cannot be ignored. OJC is significantly over permitted capacity, as well as way over bed capacity. This has led to truly deplorable conditions for our clients. Many are sleeping on floors and waiting in intake for days before a bed opens up. Others are in overcrowded units with not enough staff to keep them safe. The jail overcrowding crisis has also caused operational difficulties. Due to the way the jail was constructed, there are not enough visitation rooms for case teams to confidentially meet with clients. Attorneys regularly wait hours to visit one client. Additionally, the jail is facing staffing shortages, which has proven a hindrance to regular access to incarcerated clients.

Lastly, relating to workload and jail size, the changes to sentencing and juvenile justice laws have begun to exacerbate issues. The adult system once again includes 17 year olds, and everyone charged with non-crimes of violence now faces 85% good time before release to parole as opposed to 35% good time release before parole. While the legislative intent was to provide truth in sentencing and have Department of Corrections sentences on non crimes of violence reflect the actual time period served, we have not seen other system actors (judges and prosecutors) adjust sentences and plea offers to this new reality.

Short Term Critical Issue Areas

Public defense in Louisiana continues to lack dedicated, stable funding and resources to carry out its constitutionally mandated work. This would protect against fluctuations in the overall system of fines and fees Instead, public defense relies on "user-pay" conviction and user fees (CUF's) that continue a decade-long decline. For instance, in Fiscal Year 2013, OPD received \$1,726,613 in revenue from our local Traffic Court. In FY24, OPD received just \$360,426 from the combined Municipal and Traffic Court. Dedicated state and local funding for public defense is minimal when compared to that provided to District Attorneys These disparities exist despite public defense being mandated by both federal and state constitutions, and have significant impact on districts to respond to the demand brought by the system. Long term, the system must address these declining user fees and increase funding at the Long-Term Critical Issue Areas and other External state level to meet the constitutional mandate of indigent defense. Factors (outside of your control) that Negatively Affect In an effort to increase the overall level of representation, the State the Delivery of Services in Your District should continue advocating for an increased state appropriation, as well as supporting and advocating for local funding, particularly in the larger metropolitan districts. OPD was able to address our drastic decrease in CUF's with local funding advocacy. This has allowed us to fill the gaps created by the decline in local fines and fees/CUF's. However, it is critical that state funding not decrease because of increased local funding. As it applies to New Orleans, the City's intent is to supplement, not replace, state funding and its ongoing local funding is contingent that OPD's state-wide funding remaining consistent and not declining. Another long term issue for OPD is long term office space. Our current office building has been for sale and the future is unknown as to our stability in the physical office. We will continue exploring possible options for long-term office space. 2024 focused on the impacts of the legislative changes from the many special crime sessions, as well as the regular legislative session, and the impacts on our community and work. OPD continued our success in normalizing equitable funding between public defense and prosecution. Capacity was certainly an issue in being able to proactively pitch and create communications efforts, but we remained connected with our 2024 Media Coverage and/or Major Accomplishments local, state, and national media to inform, provide information both on the record and on background, as well as comment on particular concerns and issues. DEVELOPMENT: We were once again selected as a host site for the Black Public Defender Association's Community Engagement Summer Fellowship, as well as the Summer Law Clerkship. Our BYRNE JAG/LCLE grant was awarded and the project to expand our peer mentorship work began. OPD is divided into supervisory groups, led by supervisors and leadership staff. The leadership team consists of the District Defender, the Chief Administrative Officer, and 2 Deputy Chief Defenders. The management team consists of the Chief of Trials, Training Director, and **Describe Supervisory Structure in Your District (For** other division heads and their deputies, as well as attorney supervisors. Non-attorneys supervise the Client Services Division, the Legal Attorneys and Non-Attorneys) Assistant Division, and the Investigation Division. The CAO, the Training Director, and the heads of CSD and Investigation all have deputies with separate management responsibilities, in addition to assisting the division head. 	In 2024, OPD has continued to tackle recruiting, retention, and attrition by increasing salaries and benefits, expanding hiring, and improving office culture, support, training, and supervision. Due to successful local funding, OPD was able to fill vacant positions and increase pay for all staff, including first year attorney salaries which are now commensurate with statewide ADA salaries. Additionally, OPD continued to focus on increased resources for contract conflict representation, expanded representation in Municipal Court & Traffic Court, and improved client advocacy, including hiring people formerly incarcerated for more collaborative representation. We also continued technology and systems improvements to increase work efficiency, improve data storage and security, and drive down long term costs.

We had close to triple the number of jury trials than previous years, filed numerous writs, and increased over-all case resolutions. In order to meet this unique moment of significant increases in trial work, we have worked hard to increase resources to our trial teams through expert expenses, trainings, and necessary materials. In addition, OPD doubled the number of clients served through our Client Services Division, improving case results by directly addressing unique client needs. There were more than 1,000 referrals to CSD to provide incarceration alternatives, including services, treatment, housing, education, etc. This holistic approach continues to address overall public health and safety needs by working to stabilize, support, and address the root causes of system interaction. As with prior years, OPD relied on long-serving staff with significant institutional knowledge to ensure the delivery of public defender services and partnerships with state and local partners.




In 2024, the 42nd Judicial District Office of the Public Defender received \$489,490.87 in total revenues. Of the total revenues received, 74% of funding was derived from Conviction and User Fees (CUFs), which significantly exceeds the statewide average of 31%. Only 16 percent of district office funding was derived from state supplemental assistance.

CUFs are comprised of eight statutes that require district court judges, city court judges, and mayors to assess fines or fees on people who have been convicted of a crime, traffic violation, or ordinance. CUFs are also generated by other actions in the criminal justice system such as bond fees, forfeitures, and application fees.






Comparison of 2024 Expenditures to State Funding



The failure of the public defender's system unstable funding stream that has resulted in an increased reliance on state supplemental assistance for solvency in jurisdictions across the state, has led to the 42nd Judicial District Office of the Public Defender receiving limited supplemental state assistance. State resources have gone towards ensuring solvency in other parts of the state. During Calendar Year 2024, the office received state funding totaling only 15.5% of the office's expenditures.

As the Office of the State Public Defender seeks a stable, reliable, and adequate funding stream that is not reliant on Conviction and User Fees (CUFs) we also seek to have a criminal justice system that we can pay for. A system that focuses on non-carceral rehabilitative interventions when appropriate.
